A reading from the Book of Deuteronomy

## Second reading

A reading from St Paul's Letter to the Colossians

## Gospel reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke

**All Glory to you O Lord.**

A lawyer stood up to test Jesus. 'Teacher,' he said, 'what must I do to inherit eternal life?' He said to him, 'What is written in the law? What do you read there?' He

answered, 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbour as yourself.' And he said to him, 'You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live.' But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?'

Jesus replied, 'A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. Now by chance a priest was going down that road; and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan while traveling came near him; and when he saw him, he was moved with pity. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, "Take care of him; and when I come back, I will repay you whatever more you spend." Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbour to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?'

He said, 'The one who showed him mercy.' Jesus said to him, 'Go and do likewise.' *Luke 10:25-37*

## Sermon

It's rumoured that while President, Bill Clinton displayed on his desk a sign that said, 'It's the economy, stupid.' He knew that almost everything else followed from getting that one goal right. I wonder if Christians should put a sign on their desks, saying, 'It's about eternal life, ...'?

At the beginning of today's service, we hear perhaps the most widely quoted Bible verse from the entire New Testament: John 3:16 says, 'God so loved the world that he gave his only Son Jesus Christ to save us from our sins, to be our advocate in heaven, and to bring us to eternal life.'

That's why today's Gospel is so important. It starts with its vital opening question, 'Master, how can I attain eternal life?' It's the language of Heaven. Jesus replies by saying that eternal life involves love—love of God and love of neighbour. Automatically, we know that eternal life cannot be demanded because love is never amassed in that way. Any love worth the name is mutual and is shared, so God is sharing Himself with us and we are sharing ourselves with God. And we're sharing ourselves with each other because love is like that. You are my neighbour

and I am yours. There's a letting go here, a sense of lowering the drawbridge, opening the shutters, overlap of our lives with God and with neighbour.

As is right and proper for a lawyer, the man who questions Jesus next defines his terms. He asks. 'Who then is my neighbour?' and it's now the answers get really interesting. Jesus' response is so well known that it slips off the tongue too easily. It's like the taste of clean water or the smell of fresh air. We don't notice it any more. That's a great shame because it's meant to shock us into action. Instead of calling it the parable of the Good Samaritan, maybe it could be called the Good Catholic in Northern Ireland or the Good Muslim in a mega-Church. Maybe it's the Good Russian in Ukraine or the Good Druggie, the Good Skunk, the Good Other.

The point is that we should draw the net wide. Jesus is saying that as followers of the Lord Jesus we are prone to share the love of God with people who look like us, sound like us, act like us ... *and then stop*. Jesus says that drawing back is not acceptable. We must share God's love and mercy with others: black, white, and brown; Muslim, Hindu, and Sikh; gay, straight, and everything in between; tall and short; old and young: in fact, he is demanding complete inclusivity here. We are to invite everyone and love them. True, to follow the discussion from last week, we can stop if the person refuses our love—remember those readings with their reference to 'shaking the dust off our feet'? But as followers of the Lord Jesus we are to offer the love of God to everyone. And don't forget the start of the Gospel: we do so in order to draw down eternal life.

Jesus talks the language of love and mercy. Love and mercy demand truth. With truth, we may admit to ourselves that we want to gain eternal life for ourselves alone and keep Heaven safe from those not like us. That stance cannot be taken to imply genuine love. It would be selfish and on a par with the person who comes to Church to receive a free lunch.

The point of true love is that we want it to continue and never stop. If we truly love God, we will work at keeping it forever—which again means eternal life. In the same way, if we genuinely love our neighbour, we'll seek to stop any separation such as death, which means we'll find for the person we love the means of their eternal life so they can follow us (or we follow them) and we can then resume that love once we're reunited together with God. The point of the parable is not that the Good Samaritan was a Samaritan or that he was significantly put out. It's that he showed mercy which provoked love, which leads to eternal life.

Christian: are you showing the kind of mercy that leads to love? Will today's writers follow St Paul and writ to us, 'to the saints and faithful brothers and sisters in Christ in XXX?' Are we willing to share Heaven with people not like us? Then, and only then, will be fit for eternal life.

I therefore think its really important when we ask questions like, 'What does a successful church look like?' that the answer includes teaching its members to act like the Good Samaritan, teaches its members to love sacrificially in order to emulate Jesus, and reach out to neighbours in order to love them, and lead them with cords of love toward eternal life. To my mind, that's a Church worth joining.
