The conversion of St Paul



The conversion of the anti-Christian zealot, Saul, to the apostle of Christ, Paul, is clearly related in the Acts of the Apostles, but it has to be remembered that this was a beginning: Saul took some time to become Paul and some time to begin to understand that his call to preach—to Jew and to Gentile—the saving power of Jesus, the Son of God, was something that was a whole life's journey for him. Paul says in his Letter to the Church in Galatia, 'God set me apart before I was born and called me through his grace ... Three years after [the Damascus Road conversion], I went up to Jerusalem.'

The preparation for this moment of his conversion was his whole life. This feast has been celebrated in the Church since the sixth century but became universal in the twelfth century.

Second reading

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Saul was still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, and went to the high priest and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, 'Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?' He asked, 'Who are you, Lord?' The reply came, 'I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do.' The men who were travelling with him stood speechless because they heard the voice but saw no one. Saul got up from the ground, and though his eyes were open, he could see nothing; so they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. For three days he was without sight, and neither ate nor drank.

Now there was a disciple in Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, 'Ananias.' He answered, 'Here I am, Lord.' The Lord said to him, 'Get up and go to the street called Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul. At this moment he is praying, and he has seen in a vision a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him so that he might regain his sight.' But Ananias answered, 'Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem; and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who invoke your name.' But the Lord said to him, 'Go, for he is an instrument whom I have chosen to bring my name before Gentiles and kings and before the people of Israel; I myself will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of my name.'

So Ananias went and entered the house. He laid his hands on Saul and said, 'Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit.' And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptised, and after taking some food, he regained his strength. For several days he was with the disciples in Damascus, and immediately he began to proclaim Jesus in the synagogues, saying, 'He is the Son of God.' All who heard him were amazed and said, 'Is not this the man who made havoc in Jerusalem among those who invoked this name? And has he not come here for the purpose of bringing them bound before the chief priests?' Saul became increasingly more powerful and confounded the Jews who lived in Damascus by proving that Jesus was the Messiah. *Acts* 9:1–22

Sermon

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen

Some Christians can name the time and day of their conversion. They know for sure that they committed themselves to follow Christ on such and such a day, and at such and such a time, and in such at such and such a place. Their conversion is very specific, and very clear. I think it's fair to say that Saul/Paul would be one of those people, although he wouldn't have called himself a Christian at the time. He knew when and where he first encountered the living Christ, and he gloried in this revelation, retelling the story on more than one occasion. And who can blame him? This man, who in that phrase from Acts, 'breath[ed] threats and murder' against the disciples, suddenly becomes one of the most fervent and active followers of Christ. Saul becoming a disciple was sudden and dramatic, a complete 'metanoia', a change of heart and mind, after which nothing was the same for him, and it should probably be said, the whole world.

However, this is not the full story. As is mentioned above, although the moment of the Christophany, when Christ reveals himself to Saul, was dramatic and sudden, the conversion of Saul into Paul takes a much longer time. This is quite a comfort for people like me who can't put a date or time to their 'conversion', or name that

moment when the commitment to the Lord was made. I only know that I am committed, and I call myself a disciple of Christ.

During the time after his conversion, Paul spent time with Christians, praying, worshipping, talking, and learning, until he knew he was ready to fulfil the mission God had given him, but I'm sure Paul wouldn't have said he was the finished Christian article. He, like all Christians would continue learning, exploring and discovering. Even those believers who like Paul seem to know exactly wat they believe and exactly what God wants, need to be listening and learning, growing and flourishing.

This might be what is sometimes called 'conversion of life'. That although, some of us may know the exact date and time etc. when we chose to follow the Lord, our Christian life doesn't and shouldn't stop there. We continue to come to the Lord daily, to 'take up our cross' as Jesus put it, and ask for forgiveness, guidance, wisdom or whatever it may be. The Lord wants us to grow into maturity of faith, depth of understanding and ever greater love and hope. These and other Christian virtues can only be achieved at the 'coal face' of everyday life, as we live in the midst of the ups and downs of relationships, work, the news and the other challenges we face. For Christians there's no stepping outside of the 'secular' world, we are part of it and we live our lives of faith within it. As we know from reading the letters, Paul himself had to deal with issues which seem to have very little to do with redemption and salvation, and he had to deal with them as a Christian in a Christian way.

It's the way we tackle the challenges and difficulties we meet that demonstrates the quality of our faith, and shape us as Christians with the help of the Holy Spirit. This is 'conversion of life' lived out in real life, and is unavoidable whether we have the dramatic conversion experience of a Saul, or the slow developing into committed faith of some others.

We know that Paul went on to achieve incredible things for God, unmatched in the history of the Church, but he was following the calling God had given him, not only in actions and evangelism, but in the way he modelled the Christian life. In this way we are no different to him, we all have a calling from God and we are all called to live as disciples in a society with little interest in Christianity. This is a gift, a joy and privilege offered to us by the Lord! Amen
