Gospel reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke

All Glory to you O Lord.

On one occasion when Jesus was going to the house of a leader of the Pharisees to eat a meal on the sabbath, they were watching him closely.

When he noticed how the guests chose the places of honour, he told them a parable. When you are invited by someone to a wedding banquet, do not sit down at the place of honour, in case someone more distinguished than you has been invited by your host; and the host who invited both of you may come and say to you, "Give this person your place," and then in disgrace you would start to take the lowest place. But when you are invited, go and sit down at the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he may say to you, "Friend, move up higher"; then you will be honoured in the presence of all who sit at the table with you. For all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted.'

He said also to the one who had invited him, 'When you give a luncheon or a dinner, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your relatives or rich neighbours, in case they may invite you in return, and you would be repaid. But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind. And you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you, for you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous.' *Luke* 14:1–14

Sermon

I wonder if you're watching the cricket, the Commonwealth Games, or the winter Olympics? If so, you'll be in awe of the superheroes on show there

If you think about it, there are so many different kinds of superhero. The most

powerful are not human at all, though they look it: think of Superman or maybe the ever-popular Doctor Who. Then there are those superheroes who are definitely human but have somehow changed and mutated: this time, think of the Incredible Hulk who was human until a chance dose of radiation or Spiderman and a strange bite; maybe in similar vein, think of the countless films and stories about vampires —such as *Twilight*. Or again, we have more-or-less normal people who become a superhero because of technology, like Iron Man. And again, we see those who are human through and through but are so brilliant at something that they're almost unreal: this time, think of Batman and his ability to stop those who are evil, or then think of the many modern takes on Sherlock who is utterly brilliant. Some of these last superheroes are not good but evil like the Joker whose gifts are terrible. But all of them *are* superheroes.

On the basis that superheroes can do superhuman things, we must quiz the Bible, asking it how we who are human and normal can do something that is superhuman. The answer in today's Bible readings is clear: we can enter the presence of God.

Two of today's readings talk about kings and the third says 'leader', so we're talking about an encounter with power. One reading speaks in terms of hospitality and a banquet, surely a metaphor for the afterlife. Taken together, we're talking about the benefits we expect or want as a consequence of our encounter with power—we come into the presence of God and, if we get it right, live with Him forever. We have immortality—we become superheroes. But behind the metaphor and parable, the Gospel also discusses what happens when we enter the presence of God in the everyday which might occur through prayer, in the Eucharist, as well as seeing God in the people we meet. They may be chance encounters but, as it says in Scripture, we can entertain angels unaware. We don't want to start as a superhero and botch it so thoroughly that we lose that chance of immortality—going from hero to zero.

So, our encounters with God can lead to several significantly different conclusions. Jesus, in the Gospel passage, implies that we can try blagging it and pretend to be great in the presence of God or we can be more realistic, more humble. And that honesty is essential.

What is the honest way to start hat process of becoming a superhero? Blagging can't work because our God—the real God, the Lord Almighty, the creator of heaven and earth—is a being of unimaginable majesty and indescribable holiness. He is a being of inexpressible power and therefore we are very, very different. That's why Proverbs and Jesus in the Gospel warn us against entering the presence of this King while thinking it's a right. It's not a right but His gift, so pretence is at best hopeless and can run the risk of straying into blasphemy. Superheroes want to win, so they must start where God tells them to start.

It's therefore time to look at the middle reading, from the Letter to the Hebrews. This letter was probably written to a group of believers with a Jewish background (hence 'to the Hebrews'). In context, many of those to whom the letter was written had accepted the Christian faith but were now having second thoughts. Perhaps they felt it wasn't working, itself implying they were starting with the wrong motive. The writer therefore seeks to encourage them, telling them the benefits of following this new faith. He's stripping away the false ideas of Christianity and emphasising again and again that it's about Jesus, about faith, about pleasing God, about sharing, and about an afterlife. In recent weeks, we've been hearing from Hebrews about the 'cloud of witnesses'—superheroes again—in effect, saying, this life is possible.

The reading from Hebrews says that God is not remote but wants to help. He helped in the past, He helps today, and He will continue to do so. In fact, Hebrews cuts through the mix of provisos and motives by saying that we should enter the presence of God as a way of responding to his help. That's why he says, 'Continually offer a sacrifice of praise to God, that is, the fruit of lips that confess his name.'

... and then a mini time-bomb goes off in our soul. This giving thanks is the right lens through which we look at entering the presence of God, *but it's a fruit not a motive*. It follows and does not precede. We enter the presence of God when we (to use the phrase in Hebrews) 'confess the name'. It means living the life. It means discipleship. It means Christlikeness.

Christians, therefore, must not think they can enter the presence of God in order to access privilege, blag power, or seek favour. We don't become Christians because we want eternal life. Even less, do we follow Jesus with a view to becoming a superhero. Rather, we live the humble life of everyday discipleship. We serve the Lord Jesus, identifying with his humanity as well as looking up to His divinity. It's in that serving that we most truly know God and become superheroes of the faith. We relate to God with acts of love, acts of service, acts of loyalty, acts of obedience. It's when we deliberately perform acts of Christlikeness that we most truly enter God's presence. And ironically, we don't gain power through that encounter. We gain God Himself.

To recap: ironically we become superheroes when we become His servants. As Jesus said, 'All who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted.'
