

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John All Glory to you O Lord.

And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also. And you know the way to the place where I am going.' 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said to him, 'Lord, we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?' Jesus said to him, 'I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me.' *John 14.1–6*

Sermon

I guess many of us feel a little bit confused, but grief is a bit like that. We mourn someone that most of us—maybe all of us—never even met. She was the longest reigning Queen in a family lineage that goes back to the Dark Ages, to the dawn of the late 400s, making her a sign of stability. When anything happened in the life of the nation, we tensed until we heard a calming message from the Palace. We would then digest its words, agree or disagree, ponder and only later realise its wisdom.

In some respects, Britain has entered a new Dark Age, an era when it's almost unacceptable to talk about faith. The Queen never let us forget that she herself was a lady of faith. She was one of our finest evangelists. For example, her Christmas message always contained a formal, pithy statement describing the centrality of the Cross and her allegiance to the Lord Jesus.

It is said that the Queen as head of state was at the top of the pyramid, with different layers beneath. In her own mind, if that pyramid did exist, the top of the pyramid was God and she was lower down. In an era of radical equality, it's all too easy to think that all of us are entirely equal—you, me, everyone; with the new error that we are equal to *everyone* and by extension *equal with God*. The Queen never made that mistake. She was Queen of the Realm and was so under God. She owed everything to Him: if nothing else, presumably he had something to do with her being born to a king.

I think it's fair to follow that statement by saying that the Queen did not act in such a way as to be loved. She did not act in such a way as to respected. It was much simpler for her. She sought to be good: under God, she sought to be what she thought that He wanted her to be. Her life of faith was of course circumscribed by her birth-right. She knew that, so with her trademark wisdom, she looked, analysed, then decided what was right ... then did it. She was loved and respected *because* she lived in this way, not the other way round. May we do the same.

The Queen lived to a great age. She was 96. Almost everything in British life had changed during her long life and reign. It's easy to feel disorientated. Many of us do. With so much change, it all becomes rather difficult and life can feel like a marathon: we 'run out of steam'; we 'hit the wall'. There is a simple way to cope in such

a circumstance: we look to the finishing line with all our concentration. That's what St Paul was saying in today's second reading. He said, 'The time of my departure has come. I have fought the good fight; I have finished the race; I have kept the faith.' Through this sporting metaphor, he is laying out what's important and what is therefore less important. In a sense it's a distillation, a purifying. I think we saw that same grit and determination as the Queen sought to follow her master to the very end. May we do the same.

That determination needs a direction and a route. Jesus describes them in today's Gospel. There, we hear snippets, soundbites as the Lord Jesus talks one last time with his disciples, saying he is going to prepare a place for them in Heaven. At its end, he tells them he is 'The way, the truth and the life'. If they want Heaven, and if we want to end the race by reaching Heaven, keeping our eyes on the finishing line means always following Jesus as he leads the way—following the Lord who is our shepherd. We must follow his life of total commitment and radical love.

Elsewhere in scripture, in Matthew 25, in a parable sometimes known as the Sheep and the Goats, Jesus describes the scene when a true disciple passes from life in this world to the next. In it, he describes God saying, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world.' Being a person of faith, our dear Queen is likely to have heard those words. She ran the race, won the prize of her soul uniting with God.

I think the next consideration needs to be our own response—to the Queen, and to the Gospel that fuelled her faith, and made her who she was. Will we reorient our lives to describe a total commitment to God and a complete dedication to the Gospel. Will we fight the good fight, finish the race, keep the faith. Will we be His?
