St Francis of Assisi



Francis was probably born in Assisi, Italy in 1181. He was baptised Giovanni but his father called him 'Francesco', perhaps because he traded in France and had married a French wife.

Francis' father wanted his son to take over the family business but he was rebellious and had a difficult relationship with his father. Francis felt shame at being captured then imprisoned during a brief war with the local city of Perugia and returned a changed man.

He took to caring for disused churches and for the poor, particularly those suffering from leprosy. While praying in the semi-derelict church of St Damian, he distinctly heard the words, 'Go and repair my church, which you see is falling down.'

Francis prepared a simple Rule for his followed that witnessed to Christ through preaching repentance and emphasised the poverty of Christ. Two years before his death he received the stigmata—the marks of the wounds of Christ, on his body.

His Order spread throughout western Christendom. He died on this day in 1226,

Jesus said to his disciples, 'I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat, or about your body, what you will wear. For life is more than food, and the body more than clothing. Sermon

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen

St Francis is probably one of the most famous saints in the Church's 'Communion of Saints'. He is known and revered by people inside and outside the Church, and the religious Community he founded continues to this day in many parts of the world. Today we give thanks for his life and his enduring legacy.

He is remembered for a number of different reasons. The well-known hymn based on a prayer attributed to St Francis 'Make Me a Channel of your Peace', for example, is still sung regularly in many places. He is known for his love of the created order; images of St Francis often depict him preaching to birds, and he said to have used the phrase 'Brother Sun, Sister Moon'. He is particularly remembered for his care for the poor. He himself turned his back on the more comfortable life style offered by his father and his business, and chose to live a life of poverty. And it is thanks to St Francis that Nativity scenes became popular, as it seems he was the first person to recreate the stable with its animals in a church for people to wonder at and admire. There are, of course, many more aspects to the life and ministry of Francis but these give a flavour of his work and service.

Is it possible, then, to say of Francis without trivialising his achievements, that he has something for everyone? For those who have a concern for the environment and ecology Francis can speak to them of God's care and provision in creation. For those who have a particular interest in the poor and economic justice, Francis can speak to them of provision and solidarity. For those who love the Church and its seasons and festivals, Francis can speak to them of mission and evangelism through celebration. For those who are looking for a Rule of Life within which to live their Christian vocation the Third Order of Franciscans might be for them. These and the many other vocations and ministries that St Francis calls to mind are big areas, too big probably for one person, even a saint to deal with and the very many concerns and challenges facing the Church and the world can be overwhelming. What is important to say, however, is that although Francis may give us the opportunity to consider very important areas of Christian concern with which we may want to engage, not all of them are for everyone, but one or two of them may be for us.

God asks the Church to have a deep love and care for the same things that God called Francis to show care for, but God may give each of us personally a particular care for a particular area. How we respond to this call is also personal. Clearly, for St Francis the response was fairly dramatic, a complete change of lifestyle and prospects, for each of us it's likely to be more 'manageable'. What we have to accept

though is God has given us gifts and talents, which God wants, even expects, us to use for the good of our neighbours wherever they may be.

Francis heard the call and responded with his whole heart and life, God calls us and we also, I hope, are willing to respond with our whole heart and life if not quite in the same way as Francis did. If we do each have a particular concern that God has laid on our hearts, it is for us to pray about what God is asking us to do about it. Is God asking us to make small, or even large(!), changes in our lifestyles which will protect the environment or prioritise those less well off than ourselves? Is God reminding us through St Francis' prayers about the importance of our own spiritual lives and spending time with God? Is God reminding us of the wonderful opportunities to invite our friends and families to the big occasions in church, Christmas, Easter, Harvest? It will be different for each one of us.

St Francis inspired great faith and acts of loving service in others during his own lifetime and he does the same today. His life and ministry have been written about and analysed for many centuries and are still the objects of study and theological reflection, but with St Francis as with all the saints of the Church, as Christians we share the one most important thing in life, our love of God. Amen
