

First reading

A reading from the First book of Moses called Genesis

Jacob sent messengers before him to his brother Esau in the land of Seir, the country of Edom, instructing them, 'Thus you shall say to my lord Esau: Thus says your servant Jacob, "I have lived with Laban as an alien, and stayed until now; and I have oxen, donkeys, flocks, male and female slaves; and I have sent to tell my lord, in order that I may find favour in your sight".' The messengers returned to Jacob, saying, 'We came to your brother Esau, and he is coming to meet you, and four hundred men are with him.' Then Jacob was greatly afraid and distressed; and he divided the people that were with him, and the flocks and herds and camels, into two companies, thinking, 'If Esau comes to the one company and destroys it, then the company that is left will escape.'

And Jacob said, 'O God of my father Abraham and God of my father Isaac, O Lord who said to me, "Return to your country and to your kindred, and I will do you good," I am not worthy of the least of all the steadfast love and all the faithfulness that you have shown to your servant, for with only my staff I crossed this Jordan; and now I have become two companies. Deliver me, please, from the hand of my brother, from the hand of Esau, for I am afraid of him; he may come and kill us all, the mothers with the children. Yet you have said, 'I will surely do you good, and make your offspring as the sand of the sea, which cannot be counted because of their number".'

So he spent that night there, and from what he had with him he took a present for his brother Esau: two hundred female goats and twenty male goats, two hundred ewes and twenty rams, thirty milch camels and their colts, forty cows and ten bulls, twenty female donkeys and ten male donkeys. These he delivered into the hand of his servants, every drove by itself, and said to his servants, 'Pass on ahead of me, and put a space between drove and drove.' He instructed the foremost, 'When Esau my brother meets you, and asks you, "To whom do you belong? Where are you going? And whose are these ahead of you?" then you shall say, "They belong to your servant Jacob; they are a present sent to my lord Esau; and moreover he is behind us".' He likewise instructed the second and the third and all who followed the droves, 'You shall say the same thing to Esau when you meet him, and you shall say, "Moreover your servant Jacob is behind us".' For he thought, 'I may appease him with the present that goes ahead of me, and afterwards I shall see his face; perhaps he will accept me.' So the present passed on ahead of him; and he himself spent that night in the camp. The same night he got up and took his two wives, his two maids, and his eleven children, and crossed the ford of the Jabbok. He took them and sent them across the stream, and likewise everything that he had.

Jacob was left alone; and a man wrestled with him until daybreak. When the man saw that he did not prevail against Jacob, he struck him on the hip socket; and Jacob's hip was put out of joint as he wrestled with him. Then he said, 'Let me go, for the day is breaking.' But Jacob said, 'I will not let you go, unless you bless me.' So he said to him, 'What is your name?' And he said, 'Jacob.' Then the man said, "You shall no longer be called Jacob, but Israel, for you have striven with God and with humans, and have prevailed.' Then Jacob asked him, 'Please tell me your name.' But he said, "Why is it that you ask my name?' And there he blessed him. So Jacob called the place Peniel, saying, 'For I have seen God face to face, and yet my life is preserved.' The sun rose upon him as he passed Penuel, limping because of his hip. *Genesis 32:3–31*

Second reading

A reading from St Paul's Second Letter to Timothy

As for you, continue in what you have learned and firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it, and how from childhood you have known the sacred writings that are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work.

In the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and in view of his appearing and his kingdom, I solemnly urge you: proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favourable or unfavourable; convince, rebuke, and encourage, with the utmost patience in teaching. For the time is coming when people will not put up with sound doctrine, but having itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths. As for you, always be sober, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully. *2 Timothy 3:14—4:5*

And the Lord said, 'Listen to what the unjust judge says. And will not God grant justice to his chosen ones who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long in helping them? I tell you, he will quickly grant justice to them. And yet, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?' *Luke 18:1–8*

Sermon

Can you remember some of the times in your life when you had to learn a new skill —maybe something that didn't come easily to you at first? I can just about remember learning to ride a bike. I was fortunate to have a three-wheeler first of all—that was quite easy—but then came the real thing—the two wheeled bicycle. I can't remember how many times I fell off, but when I could balance and wobble off on my own, it was wonderful. I guess I heard encouraging words from my parents: 'keep trying,' 'don't give up' and those familiar words: 'If at first you don't succeed, try, try, try again.' Like riding a bike, there are many things in life we have to do over and over again before we succeed—maybe learning to drive a car, or learning to play a musical instrument, and we have to persevere—we have to keep practising again and again. Today's Bible readings speak to us about faithful endurance and show us how persistence can be worthwhile even though it may come at a cost.

In the reading from Genesis, Jacob wrestled with a stranger at night. It went on for a long time and we don't know who won but the important thing is that even though he was hurt, Jacob wouldn't give up until he received the blessing he pleaded from the stranger.

Paul's letter to Timothy urges him to persevere in his teaching, remaining firmly committed to the truth that he had been taught.

In recent weeks, our Gospel readings have featured one of Jesus' parables, often focused on social justice, particularly for the marginalised. Today we heard the parable of the widow and the judge and I think the opening words of the parable sum up its message: 'One day Jesus told his disciples a story to show that they should always pray and never give up.'

Jesus used people and situations that would be well known to the people of the day in order to help them understand his teaching. His audience would probably have smiled knowingly as religious literature as well as the Bible often used poor widows and unjust judges as subjects. Yet throughout the Old Testament, God's people are repeatedly told that in order to reflect God's values and love, they need to show particular care to the widow as well as the orphan.

In the story today, the judge has all the power on his side and the woman who doesn't even have a male relative to do her pleading for her is at the bottom of the pecking order—in fact, she was probably considered to be a social outcast. All the same, by sheer persistence, she gets what she wants in the end, even if the judge just wanted a quiet life. Jesus' parable also reminds us that God is the supreme judge who is just and merciful and who will always respond to our petitions according to our needs. If even an unjust judge can give a just decision in the end,

then God will surely give justice to those who persevere in prayer.

And perhaps there's another message too. We often hear or read news headlines about people who are persistent in their striving for justice; we will all be familiar with the prolonged petition for justice for the victims of the Hillsborough football tragedy. Do we ourselves (like the judge) just desire a quiet life or (like the widow) are we strong enough to stand up for what we believe?

I think part of the essence of prayer is being persistent, having regular conversations with God. I could talk about times in my life when I prayed to God at a moment of crisis—when my life was in danger—and God answered my prayer immediately. I recall those moments as miracles. But at other times, God answers our prayers by giving us opportunities to be the answer to them ourselves. Sometimes, prayers are prayed but because outcomes can be difficult to identify, we might wonder if God listens. But God loves us too much to always give us easy solutions. Prayer is an act of faith. God knows that we learn and grow most, and value solutions most, when we have to keep on working towards them, persevering through prayer.

I'd like to share this poem. It's called 'Perseverance Works.'

I sought a job, a new career, and found a factory fairly near;

I signed away a year or two to work as factory workers do.

The walls were grey and working grim,

to spend one's days in light so dim,

for in that dull and dusty place, could scarcely see another's face.

But through a window in the wall a shaft of light would sometimes fall

upon the factory's name, which lurked in darkness:

'Perseverance Works.'

For weeks and months, I learnt of hope

though through long days of toil I'd grope

and 'ere I thought all hope had gone,

the factory's name would lead me on.

Now I've moved on and been gone for many years,

but in my memory still lurks the promise: 'Perseverance Works'.
