Gospel reading

When Jesus came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written:

Sermon

Today is known as Bible Sunday, Now, you might say 'surely every Sunday is Bible Sunday?'. This is a fair point, because we do read from the Bible every week and we do try, in some small way, to reflect on what the Bible is saying to us week by week and to weave it into our lives and worship.

But the idea of Bible Sunday is to take a small step back from the weekly readings and to seek to look at the Bible as a whole. To think about and reflect on the importance and meaning of what we call 'the Bible'.

I am not going to embark on a theological history of the Bible (phew!), though some history will creep in. It is still the world's best-selling and most-translated book, even though it probably isn't read, at least in this country, nearly as much as it was a hundred years ago, or five hundred years ago when ordinary people first got their hands on the scriptures in English. And that's a story in itself—Google John Wycliffe to find out about how the Bible was translated into English. It was a real religious revolution, and it changed countless lives, and the Church itself.

The Bible is not just one book, but a whole a library of books, written by many different human authors over a thousand or so years, in Hebrew and in Greek, and at different times. The early Church in the fourth century collected these books, from scrolls and oral traditions, and decided on the contents (called the 'canon'). It took quite a bit of time to decide which books to consider as Holy Scripture and which books to leave out of the Bible. Even today we cannot agree completely. You'll find that particular books (the 'Apocrypha', for example) are included in the Bible of some traditions that are left out of those of other Christian traditions.

And in our society, we can see a variety of approaches to the Bible. One is that it is a load of outdated, dangerous nonsense that we should leave in the past. That

it's not relevant to the present, so why should people bother with it, except to see it as a source of art and literature.

Another way that it is misused is for someone to treat the Bible as simply a list of ethical rules. They then take that list of ethical rules and apply them, usually not to themselves, but to those around them, often in a condemnatory fashion. Sadly, some Christians and some churches seem to build their whole lives and ministry believing themselves to be superior to others because they believe and follow the rules whereas others do not, rather like the Pharisees. That does not mean that 'anything goes', which it might if someone sees the Bible as an irrelevance, but it does mean that if we use the Bible to point the finger at other people we shall find the same judgement given to us. This can be very destructive and it can be seen in some cases as a justification for racism, sexism and homophobia.

Then it is possible to take every word as the literal, unchanging truth and treat the Bible as a sort of textbook of science and history. It takes quite a bit of mental gymnastics to hold this kind of view, because you've got to get your head round fossils and Ice Ages, but it is certainly a view held by some. I know a very devout person who told me that fossils were put there by God as a red herring, like the tree in the garden of Eden, to let us exercise our free will to believe the literal, seven-day story of the creation of the world or not. Which I find very sad, because this person can't see the whole creation of God in all its glorious complexity.

So, if the Bible is not to be relegated, used to judge or slavishly adhered to, what should we do? The important thing to remember is that the Bible is not just a series of disconnected stories but that it is a grand, sweeping story of God's relationship with his people. It is for us, his people, to explore that big story so that the small stories make sense and, more importantly, so that we can grow in our faith and advance along our journey. The Bible shows us how God revealed Himself in the world, and the source of our knowledge of Jesus Christ, who is the true Word of God. It points to him, not to itself.

And we shouldn't be afraid to think when we read the Bible. One very important tradition of the Church is to read the Bible together, as a community, as well as individually for study. This means we can explore its possible meanings and learn from one another.

We need to think how we will engage with the Bible—maybe make a New Church Year resolution for Advent to read and meditate on the set readings for the day? Find and follow a course of directed readings? Whatever we do, we need to enjoy it, debate about it, meditate with it, let it get under our skin. It is a unique gift that has lasted for millennia and will endure for many more. We need to be so familiar with His word that that the ears of our hearts can hear the unfamiliar and

the unexpected so we may be ready for the unexpected possibilities the God of Life and Love offers to us all.

On this Bible Sunday let us give thanks for God's word living and breathing through us, and remember that we may be the only Bible some person ever reads. Amen.
