Alfred the Great



Alfred was born in 849. He was the king of the West Saxons and effectively ended the constant threat of Danish dominion in the British Isles. He came to the throne at the age of twenty-two and, after establishing peace, set about bringing stability to both Church and state. He gave half his income to found religious houses which themselves acted as Christian centres for education, care of the sick and poor, and respite for travellers. He attended worship every day and himself translated many works into the vernacular. He evolved a legal code based on common sense and Christian mercy. His whole life was marked by the compassion of Christ.

He died on this day in the year 899.

Sermon

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen

'Do not love the world or the things of the world.' Words from the First Letter of St John, quoted above. Think about those words. The more I think about them, the more counter cultural and counter intuitive they seem. Surely as Christians, our commandment is to love first God, then God's people, then the things of God including creation and the natural world. Well yes, but of course the 'world' mentioned in this letter is the world of material wealth, power, influence, popularity, acquisition of possessions and the rest. These worldly things were incredibly important and much sought after at the time St John was writing. The Roman Empire

and its citizens loved show and magnificence and all the trappings of wealth, and of course this world view spread to the people the Romans had conquered. Shows of wealth, entourages of hangers on, expensive fashions and jewellery and all the things we associate with the rich and famous, and social media influencers today, were just as attractive two thousand years ago, so for St John to write those words about not loving the world and the things of the world, was incredibly radical then, and I would argue still is.

They are a reminder that the teachings of Jesus, although based on the teachings inherited from the Old Testament and very familiar to us, are 'not of this world', by which I mean they run counter to what appears attractive and popular and desirable. I wonder whether you would consider yourself materialistic? Perhaps not, but I certainly look at myself sometimes and wonder if my lifestyle really reflects my Christian faith and the priorities that should follow.

You will have read the short introduction to Alfred the Great at the beginning of this service, and can make the connection between what we know of his life and the short passage from John's letter. Alfred the Great was an Anglo-Saxon king who famously, and sadly apocryphally, burnt the cakes because his attention was on his duty as a king to defend his people and not on baking. He established monasteries, promoted learning, visited Rome and codified laws. In other words, he took his responsibilities as a leader of people seriously, and did all he could to promote the welfare and security of those he ruled. He was, of course, motivated by his deep and well-informed Christian faith. He didn't use his kingly authority to pursue the 'worldly' treasure that St John warns us against.

We are, of course, not kings! Neither, I assume, do we feel we have authority and power over others as a king has. Nor do we, most likely, have access to the opportunities to acquire wealth in the way that kings and other world leaders have, but that doesn't mean we should rest on our laurels. A Christian shouldn't say, 'I don't do that' and leave it there.

The temptations of the world, and of advertising are all about us, and who among us can say we never buy anything we don't really need? Or, indeed, that we regularly and seriously consider how we dispose of our income. Jesus frequently spoke about money, power and influence, and he very rarely spoke to kings and earthly rulers. He wasn't so much saying give your money to God or the Church, but rather consider what is important to you, consider what you value. In a way, this is a part of us monitoring our spiritual health. Our spiritual health and wellbeing involve not only our prayer lives, but rather our prayer and spiritual lives should influence the rest of our lives and lifestyles. These things clearly influenced King Alfred and how he governed, spent his time and spent his money.

I hope I'm not making tangential links between us, Alfred and St John, but isn't how Christians interpret the world and our own lives based on scripture, tradition (Alfred) and in this case our own experience? Aren't the readings we use and the stories from the past meant to inform our own way of living and our own understanding of the faith?

Alfred was a man of authority and wealth who held a sincere faith, and who followed the precepts of that faith closely, allowing the teachings of Christ to inform his decisions about his own life and the lives of his people. In this way he is an example to all of us. I've drawn out what struck me most about his life and todays readings. I wonder what stands out for you today? Amen
