

'So he told me and gave me the interpretation of these things: "The four great beasts are four kings that will rise from the earth. But the holy people of the Most High will receive the kingdom and will possess it forever—yes, for ever and ever".' *Daniel 7:1–3, 15–18*

Second reading

A reading from St Paul's Letter to the Ephesians

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, to God's holy people in Ephesus, the faithful in Christ Jesus: Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in the heavenly realms with every spiritual blessing in Christ. For he chose us in him before the creation of the world to be holy and blameless in his sight. Gospel reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke All Glory to you O Lord.

Looking at his disciples, [Jesus] said:

'Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God. Blessed are you who hunger now, for you will be satisfied.

Blessed are you who weep now,
for you will laugh.

Blessed are you when people hate you,
when they exclude you and insult you

Sermon

'We have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and your love for all the saints' (Colossians 1:4).

Paul writes to a church he has never visited but has heard great things of them. And this odd word 'saint' appears—who on earth are they and what can it mean for us now, today.

Let's start out with the superhero saints the ones given the title, the special ones. Is Paul speaking of them—no for there are no such people at this time—there are the apostles and already the martyrs but no particular focus on them.

Are any of you superhero movie fans—*Avengers* or *Justice League*? So often these films and stories are riddled with exceptional, empowered, otherworldly types who turn up to rescue the world from catastrophe. Just occasionally there are the ordinary trained individuals who can match them and sometimes out do them but they are the rarity. And we can see the same in the named saints—these are the exceptionals, the ones who achieve somehow great things in their lives, win great battles intellectually and spiritually and change the world somehow.

Where is there room for me in my littleness and insignificance? The danger for the superhero movie is that there is no room for the ordinary and we should always be aware of Jesus' terrible challenge that turns the world upside down as in our gospel reading today. The church is the place where the powerless are the heroes, where the little is honoured, where the powerful and the comfortable are seen as having received all their blessing leaving the rest of us to take what God offers. As Stuart Townend puts it in one of our hymns today 'Not to the powerful but to the poor he came and hungry humble hearts were satisfied again.'

So what about us Unexceptionals? Well we are the saints Paul is talking about—it is his shorthand for the church, the people of God. Hurrah for all the specials have achieved for God but three cheers too for what each and everyone of us means to the Kingdom of God. Us ordinary, struggling, relatively ungifted, insignificant ones are actually lifted, redeemed, renewed, restored by God and by His choice become his people, his family, his friends, known and loved by God. Held in the Father's arms and valued, given a place at his table.

What that actually means is that in Kingdom terms you and what you do is valued, known, necessary and as we offer what we have and what we are to Father God then the Kingdom advances.

Worldwide the church of God has grown extraordinarily over the last 150 years. At the front line of that have been the sacrifices of many who went out from our shores and lived and died sharing Christ with the world. And I could tell you some little-known stories of some of them—the price they paid is humbling. But they could only do that because of the commitment of many to support and pray and give that they might succeed. Behind any front-line battle success and failure may rest not on the fighters but on the logistics, the supply line the many behind each one.

And beyond that we are each called in our lives to be that 'touching place' from another of our hymns today—the hands and the feet and the voice of Jesus that meet and hold and love those who cross our paths. And because we are known and loved and filled by God, he meets us there through us lives are met by Him!

The Liturgy of the Sacrament

Eucharistic Prayer (prayer E)

The Lord be with you

All and also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

All We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

All It is right to give thanks and praise.

It is indeed right, our duty and our joy that we should always sing of your glory, holy Father, almighty and eternal God, through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord. For you are the hope of the nations, the builder of the city that is to come. Your love made visible in Jesus Christ brings home the lost, restores the sinner and gives dignity to the despised. In his face your light shines out, flooding lives with goodness and truth, gathering into one in your kingdom a divided and broken humanity. Therefore, with all who can give voice in your creation we glorify your name, for ever praising you and saying:

All Holy, holy, holy Lord,
God of power and might,
heaven and earth are full of your glory.

Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.

Great is the mystery of faith:

All Christ has died.
Christ is risen.
Christ will come again.

Lord of all life, help us to work together for that day when your kingdom comes and justice and mercy will be seen in all the earth.

Look with favour on your people, gather us in your loving arms and bring us with all the saints to feast at your table in heaven.

Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory are yours, O loving Father, for ever and ever.
