StNicholas



Nicholas was a fourth-century bishop of Myra in Asia Minor (southern Turkey), but very little is known about the historical figure behind the legends.

His reputation as a worker of wonders was enhanced by a ninth-century hagiography, and is now better known through these stories than otherwise. Many concern his love and care for children, how he fed the hungry, healed the sick and cared for the oppressed. He saved three girls from a life of prostitution by providing them with dowries and so developed the tradition of bearing gifts to children on his feast day—a practice appropriated by later Christmas celebrations.

The manner of Nicholas' death is not known but is not thought to have been martyrdom.

Sermon

Poor old Nicholas—I'm sure he would be appalled at what he has become – this caricature of a figure bringing presents—and often to those who have too much anyway. And the sickening commercialisation of the time—used to sell things. Instead he was a man who gave quietly to the poor and destitute, to the struggling and the needy—the story I have heard of him is simply the arrival of parcels at the door of a house with no preliminaries and no expectations simply the meeting of a need.

In other Christian traditions this feast is the one where gifts are given in memory of this man and his transformative actions. Where did his motivation come from?

Are you a Transformers fan? The toys or the rather silly but amusing films? It really caught the imagination of many kids—the robots that could change and look like a car, a lorry, a plane, a helicopter. Radical change, hidden in plain sight, ready to transform into action.

Firstly, we are recipients of a *transformative saviour*—Our God is one who does not despise our littleness and our neediness instead he steps into it that he might change it. The God who takes on flesh, who does not despise suffering, who knows what rejection looks and feels like, who is stripped of all pretence and all pride in his suffering on the cross. And in his death and resurrection opens the way for our change.

Then we are part of a *transformed people* who have been called and rescued and filled with Holy Spirit that we might become overcomers, might become changed people, might be used and useful to our God. A small band of people from the far borders of empire that turned the Empire upside down. And throughout the centuries the church has acted to be a transforming people—so much of what the state now provides we as the people of God brought into existence—schools, hospitals, social care, caring for the foreigner and the stranger. And where the gospel has had impact changing cultures for the better while respecting their strengths. We've got it wrong sometimes—but actually the good far, far outweighs the bad (when did a good news story last get in the papers!).

So finally, what of us? We are *called to be transformers*, people who live the life of the Spirit now, who see the need and act, who are willing to get involved in changing things, who can introduce others to the one who makes a difference, who can turn lives upside down, right way out. The One who loves us so much that he was willing to act on our behalf.
