Praise to you O Christ

Sermon

A young child went to bed. It was dark, and the faint light cast amazing shadows on the ceiling of her room. 'Mum ...' her voice travelled downstairs. 'It's dark and I'm lonely!' Her mother knew the scene well, so she merely shouted upstairs, 'You've got teddy! Now go to sleep.'

The child persisted. 'Teddy is not real.' It had been a hard day for Mum, and she was exasperated. 'You have God with you' she shouted up the stairs, 'Now go to sleep.' But the child was insistent, 'But mum ... I want someone who I can hold on to.'

How like us. Since the dawn of time, people have wanted a God they can somehow see and hear, a God they can talk with and understand. A God they can hold on to. It's a theme throughout most of the Old Testament section of the Bible. That's surely what the previous reading, from the letter to the Hebrews was all about: 'Long ago God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets.'

And God spoke in many and various ways because the people at the time either weren't satisfied with what they heard about God, or simply misunderstood. Think of the ghastly things some of the earlier prophets said about God: that he was a God of vengeance, or was a God who was always angry. That he was a God who delighted in genocide and killing and blood. This is not a pleasant God. This is not a God who is even worth following. By no stretch of the imagination is this God the sort *anyone* would want to hold on to.

Desperate situations require desperate remedies. I think it's clear that God always wanted humankind to know him. That's why he persisted in these many and various ways with his prophets. He finally gave up on that idea—of speaking through people (the prophets)—it was somehow too indirect. It worked up to a point, but frankly no further.

So God decided to come to earth in person. So far, so good. God wanted us to know that he was genuinely human, as well as genuinely God. So he decided to come to earth in a straightforward, human way: he was not going to be superman, flying through the air with his underpants outside his suit. Why listen to someone —or something—who has no idea what it's like to be a human? There is no point in it, because when the superhero says, 'God wants you to do such and such ...' we'd simply say, 'well it's easy for *you* ... but what about *us*?'

When God came to earth, it was as a human being, pure and simple, and without question. In other words, God's grand plan needed God to come as a real human, in real time, with real parents and with a real life in a real country, with real problems and with a real death. In other words, he came as one of us. But through it all, he is still God: as the author of the epistle says, he was 'the reflection of God's glory and the exact imprint of God's very being.' And it's him that God wants us to hold on to.

So that's what God did. And that's exactly who Jesus was and is. In this way, one of the greatest of the prophecies of the Old Testament could finally start to come true. The prophet Jeremiah said, in chapter 34 and verse 34 of the book named after him, 'People will no longer need to teach their neighbours, nor will they need to teach their relatives, saying, 'You should know God." For everyone, from the least to the greatest, will know me already. And I will forgive their wickedness, and I will never again remember their sins.'

That last bit about sins is a natural consequence, and is vitally important: if we don't know God, then how on earth can we know what God is like? And if we don't know what God is like, how can we know what he wants of us? Clearly, we can't. But here is the crucial message of Christmas: because we *can* know God — through his human son Jesus—we *can* know what we *are* meant to be like, and what we are meant to *do*. So by looking closely at the life of Jesus and trying to mirror it, we too can know what God is like. And hold on to him.

Over the coming few days, all of us will be singing our favourite carols. One of my favourites is *O little town of Bethlehem*. Near its end comes the important line, a prayer that asks God to 'cast out our sin and enter in: be born in us today.' *That* is the message of Christmas expressed by a hymn writer. One of the earliest Christian writers expressed the same truth in slightly different words, 'God became a human that we might share his divinity.' In other words, we can know right from wrong, enter into a relationship with God, and thereby experience eternal life. Now that *is* a God worth hanging on to.

A child went to bed one night, and wanted a tangible presence: someone to hold on to. In the dark, the child cried out, 'Mummy, I want a God I can hold on to.' The child is like us, in a dark world, with dark fears in our lives and with dark pressures and dark people around,' we too need a God we can hold on to.

And, praise God, we have one—Jesus who is born afresh tonight. Let us hold on to him, and with great joy.
