First reading

A reading from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah

Second reading

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Peter said, 'I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.' *Acts* 10:34–43

Sermon

How did we get from the baby Jesus in a manger, the whole nativity and Christmas to Jesus being baptised as a 30-ish year-old man in such a short time—a matter of, what, two weeks? In fact, when you think of it, we still had Jesus in the manger and the three wise men finding him on Epiphany, the twelfth day of Christmas.

We don't have much to read in the Holy Scriptures about Jesus between his birth and his being named and, now, this account of his baptism, except for the story of when he was about 12 years old, and he stayed behind at the Temple while his family journeyed on. This adds to the importance of the events of his baptism when the Holy Spirit descended on him like a dove. It is at that moment that Jesus begins his public ministry.

Like the others whom John is baptising, Jesus is immersed in the River Jordan. However, when he came back up, the Holy Spirit that he will later pass onto others, comes upon him in visible form. The appearance is that of a dove. And a voice from heaven declares Jesus, as the Son of God and that with him, the Spirit of God will remain. Remember when Jesus was leaving the Disciples here on Earth, he said to them, 'My Spirit I will give to you.' During the very brief span of Jesus' earthly ministry, the total activity of God's Holy Spirit was through Jesus. Anointed with the Holy Spirit, Jesus made obvious God's Divine Compassion in deeds of healing, and in setting free those who were victims of the power of evil.

Jesus' baptism is a life-changing event for all of us because we are then baptised with the baptism of Jesus Christ. We are claimed by God through our faith in Jesus Christ. We know to whom we belong. Our baptism can remind us that no one determines our worth! We belong to God ... and in baptism he says to us 'You are my Beloved!' Our identity, as mysterious as it is, is in Jesus Christ, as we ourselves are sealed as Christ's own forever.

Last week we held our annual convent renewal service in *which we celebrate all* that God has done for us and affirm that we give our lives and choices to Him. Through our baptism, during that service last week and whenever we attend a baptism in the church, we get the chance to grow and develop our close personal relationship

with God, but it doesn't end there. Because of our baptism, we are called to reach out to others, just as Jesus did. In our baptism we are called beyond ourselves.

I remember hearing or reading somewhere that someone referred to baptism as 'the daily garment which we as Christians are to wear all the time.' That is the pattern of where our Christian life comes from, the continuous dynamics of our baptism. Being brought low or humbled or going down into the water, so to speak, washed by what happens in our lives, but then ... RAISED UP. Every day is a new experience of that cycle if we allow ourselves to realise it. And to recognise our sin, our brokenness, our need for repentance, but then, to remember that we are members of the Body of Christ, one in him who dwells in us. Therefore, we can feel revitalised, and we can be restored.

All of this, if we truly live it, allows us to thrive in the season of Epiphany, the time after Christmas when we celebrate the light of Christ, especially in our darkest hours: the reality of the baptism of Jesus and our baptism and the power of the Holy Spirit that dwells within us. Renewing our baptismal covenant helps us remember that we are part of the whole family of Christ.

Baptism is also remarkable for another reason; it calls us to look beyond ourselves to the world God has made and loves. It is like a good marriage where each is committed to the other out of love, but we also accept responsibilities because of that love. Because we are baptised, our lives are different. Just as when we love someone, our lives are different because our focus is different.

Baptism is a huge symbol: it's the water of creation; we are born anew to life in the Spirit and all the bad 'stuff' is washed off. That original (or 'primal'), sin of pride, the sin of selfishness and ego is symbolically washed off. Baptism is the death of the old self. The old passes away and a new creation is born. What a staggering gift!

Remember when two of the disciples of Jesus, James and John, came to him asking for places of honour in His heavenly Kingdom? Jesus answered them by asking, 'Are you able to be baptised with the baptism I have been baptised with?' He meant that there is a calling in our baptisms. We have been given special gifts by God ... and we are called by God to use those gifts for the blessing of others. Our baptism is not just something to hold for ourselves. It sends us out into God's world. We are commissioned as God's people, marked as Christ's own forever. We are sent to serve our Lord. We are often called to serve the Lord right where we are, here and now—with the people we know, in the places where we live and work. That's usually where we can make the most difference. But, we need to realise that we each have our own special gifts to be used in the service of our Lord who gave us the gifts in the first place. We don't all have the same gifts. So, that is

all the more reason that we need to be mindful of our own gifts, what we do have to offer.

God has given each one of us special gifts that set us apart from others. Like snowflakes, no two of us are alike. There is only one of you. Each one of us is different and each one of us has something special to share with others. Not only has God gifted each one of us with something very special, and not only do we have a variety of gifts, but also, if these gifts are exercised with love and commitment, ALL of God's people are strengthened.

Too often we look upon the Christian life in terms of duty and obligation. How much better it is when we see our faith in Christ as a gift to be received with gratitude and expressed with joy. Then our attitude in approaching each day is one of anticipating what opportunities will open up for us to use the gifts God has given us. Just as Jesus became empowered for the ministry he was called to; may we realise that we too are empowered for our own ministry...to serve the Lord in whatever form that may take in our own lives.

OUR baptism reminds us that we belong to the Lord. Every time we cross ourselves or every time we wash, we proclaim that; we remind ourselves that we were sealed in baptism as Christ's own *forever*.

If these thoughts seem a little radical, or simply new, it might help to remember that the liturgy used in a service of baptism got there first. At the so-called vows, the priest asks the person being baptised (or their parents and godparents) a series of questions. The first three ask them to turn away from the past and the second set of three ask the candidate to put Jesus in the place left vacant by that repentance.

I'm going to read the questions one at a time and, if you want, respond with a silent 'Yes'. Here goes:

- 1. Do you reject the devil and all rebellion against God?
- 2. Do you renounce the deceit and corruption of evil?
- 3. Do you repent of the sins that separate us from God and neighbour?
- 4. Do you turn to Christ as Saviour?
- 5. Do you submit to Christ as Lord?
- 6. Do you come to Christ, the way, the truth and the life?

In summary, then:

God claims us.

We are His.

Jesus is the Lord of our lives and baptism is the sacramental way of expressing that truth. Thank you, Lord!

The Liturgy of the Sacrament

Eucharistic Prayer (prayer E)

The Lord be with you

All and also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

All We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

All It is right to give thanks and praise.

It is truly right and just, our duty and our salvation, always and everywhere to give you thanks, holy Father, almighty and eternal God. You celebrated your new gift of baptism in signs and wonders at the Jordan. Your voice was heard from heaven to awaken faith in the presence among us of your Word made flesh. Your Spirit was seen as a dove, revealing Jesus as your servant, and anointing him with the oil of gladness to preach the good news to the poor. Therefore, as we celebrate the union of earth and heaven, we rejoice to echo the song of the angels in heaven for ever praising you and saying:

All Holy, holy, holy Lord,
God of power and might,
heaven and earth are full of your glory.
Hosanna in the highest.

and justice and mercy will be seen in all the earth.
