StAelred of Hexham



Aelred was the son of a priest. He was born at Hexham in 1109 and entered the Cistercian Order at Rievaulx in about 1133, after spending some years in the court of King David of Scotland. He became Abbot of Revesby in 1143 and returned to Rievaulx four years later to become abbot and to spend the remainder of his life. That's why he sometimes styled, 'Aelred of Rievaulx'.

Aelred was profoundly influential through his spiritual writings, which he began at the request of Bernard of Clairvaux, the two having a similar approach to the spiritual life. Because of this, Aelred was often called the 'Bernard of the North.' He died on this day at Rievaulx in 1167.

Sermon

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen

I'm writing this reflection after New Year's Day and before Epiphany, so during the twelve days of Christmas. Traditionally Christmas decorations remain up until Epiphany, but I've already cleared my living room of the Christmas cards I received, the Christmas ornaments I had on display, and even the huge number of tealight holders I love to use at Christmas, only the Nativity scene remains in my front window with the star hanging above. The vicarage looks quite bare, and if I'm honest, a bit sadder than it did this time yesterday.

Why do I mention this bit of Christmastide trivia? Well, as I was reading and contemplating the readings appointed for Aelred, I was particularly struck by the emphasis on 'possessions', and our response or even relationship with or to them. I do feel that the living room here seems to be denuded of candles, despite the many other ornaments and books I have around me, and the fact that in the Church it's still Christmas! In the gospel Jesus exhorts his followers to sell their possessions and give alms. This is incredibly challenging now, and of course was then, and I wonder if I heard Jesus saying that to me how seriously I'd take it, not because I don't want to follow Jesus, but because I don't want to sell my stuff even for the poor.

Very, very few I imagine, do sell their possessions in the way Jesus seems to suggest, but of course Aelred as a member of a religious community would have done something just as radical. He would have pooled his own material resources with those of the community as a whole in order to support the community and its mission. Indeed, members of religious communities continue to do this today.

The readings prompt me to contrast my attachment to what I own, and my attachment to Christ. Are we able to say with St Paul that we regard 'everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ'? I don't think this is a figure of speech for Paul. I think his love of Christ was so profound that for him these words are profoundly true, and he wants his readers to find them profoundly true as well. Paul's readers were living in very precarious circumstances where persecution and even death were real possibilities; the temptation to conform to the world and remain safe, rather than follow Christ and be in danger would have been huge. Although, thankfully, not living in such dangerous times, the temptation for us to conform to worldly expectations of material comfort is more subtle and insidious. As I've said, I'm writing after Christmas and a member of the congregation here has already donated quite a lot of their unwanted or unneeded presents to the church. I'm sure the family enjoyed opening them and were grateful for receiving them, but on reflection realised that they could be put to better use by the

Foodbank or woman's refuge. This of course, is in response to having more than enough of the things they were given, not the everything Jesus and St Paul mention.

In turn this prompts the question, if Jesus asks us to sell our possessions and give to the poor, and Paul writes that everything is loss compared to the surpassing value of Christ, how do I balance my attachment, (I won't say love) of what I own, to the love I have for Christ? What would I be prepared to lose in order to remain in a right relationship with him? A few clothes I don't need? My car? Everything? These questions are impossible to answer, but I think, are worth contemplating, because in the New Testament there is teaching which encourages to be suspicious of our reliance on what we own and have, in comparison to how we build our lives on God and God's care.

I seem to have meandered a long way from Aelred of Hexham and his life. As a monk, even though he may not have had many possessions he could call his own, he was part of a stable community who new where their next meal was coming from, and had quite a grand monastery to live in. And yet, he no doubt also contemplated the teaching of Christ and the letters of Paul and wondered where he fitted in, and how much deeper God was asking him to go. This seems to me to be the daily task of the Christian, to read God's word and know it to be speaking to us about ourselves and our lives. It is our response to what we read and hear that is important and demonstrates our willingness to accept the 'surpassing value of knowing Jesus Christ my Lord.' Amen
