First reading

A reading from the book of the Prophet Isaiah

Listen to me, O coastlands, pay attention, you peoples from far away! The Lord called me before I was born, while I was in my mother's womb he named me. He made my mouth like a sharp sword, in the shadow of his hand he hid me; he made me a polished arrow, in his quiver he hid me away. And he said to me, 'You are my servant, Israel, in whom I will be glorified.' But I said, 'I have laboured in vain, I have spent my strength for nothing and vanity; yet surely my cause is with the Lord, and my reward with my God.' Gospel reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John

All Glory to you O Lord.

The next day he saw Jesus coming toward him and declared, 'Here is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world! This is he of whom I said, "After me comes a man who ranks ahead of me because he was before me." I myself did not know him; but I came baptising with water for this reason, that he might be revealed to Israel.' And John testified, 'I saw the Spirit descending from heaven like a dove, and it remained on him. I myself did not know him, but the one who sent me to baptise with water said to me, 'He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain is the one who baptises with the Holy Spirit.' And I myself have seen and have testified that this is the Son of God.' The next day John again was standing

with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he exclaimed, 'Look, here is the Lamb of God!'

The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. When Jesus turned and saw them following, he said to them, 'What are you looking for?' They said to him, 'Rabbi' (which translated means Teacher), 'where are you staying?' He said to them, 'Come and see.' They came and saw where he was staying, and they remained with him that day. It was about four o'clock in the afternoon. One of the two who heard John speak and followed him was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. He first found his brother Simon and said to him, 'We have found the Messiah' (which is translated Anointed). He brought Simon to Jesus, who looked at him and said, 'You are Simon son of John. You are to be called Cephas' (which is translated Peter). *John 1:29–42*

Sermon

Epiphany is a surprising realisation of truth or reality often resulting in a reappraisal of attitude and understanding. It's an 'aha moment'.

John points out to Andrew the extraordinary nature of Jesus and Andrew explores it and from that meeting and excitement he passes it on to his brother Simon Peter. What is this revelation of John? 'Behold the Lamb of God'. Let's explore together what that means.

1. The sentimental?

First thought for most townies if you say lamb is 'ahh, how adorable, how fluffy' (that's when they don't think mint sauce!)

Is John thinking of Jesus as this comforting, nice, meek and mild character? What's life changing, challenging about that—quite the reverse. This meek and mild, sentimental view of both Jesus and God is found often in Victorian hymns and poems and is quite the opposite of the gritty challenging God of the scriptures. God is **not** nice! He is challenging, demanding, pure and holy, terrifyingly glorious, not some cosmic teddy bear to tell us everything is alright—because it ain't!

2. The sacrificial

To the Jewish ear of the time of Jesus the lamb is a central part of the sacrificial system (not the only one) and so the immediate echo of the declaration of John is to think of sacrifice for sin. (NB the sacrificial system is often reduced in our thinking to this alone—in reality most sacrifices were thanksgiving and so part of

the animal went to God (think of Leviticus 3:16!) and his service the rest is used as a meal, a feast, for the family who celebrate with God his goodness.

But also vital is that there has to be an answer to my failures and failings else how can mortal man approach the living God. A reminder—God is NOT nice—he's a tough challenging person to deal with. So if Jesus is proclaimed 'the Lamb of God' then he is God's provision for our sins, the sacrifice that works. Note the echo for the educated Jew of the provision of God to Abraham at Mount Moriah.

3. The bringer of Salvation

There is another echo—that of the Passover Lamb. Remember that Jesus died at the Passover—why did God choose that time for it to happen? Because he is the Lamb given.

At the heart of the Passover celebrations is the eating of the lamb prepared for the people. And Passover is about 2 things (at least!)

Firstly the rescue of the people from slavery, from the terrible conditions and the failure of any future hope. Freedom if they will but follow God's instructions and follow where he leads them. A freedom that extends to freedom from the fear of recapture as the power of Egypt is crushed.

But secondly they are rescued into a new position—once they were not a people but now they become the people of God. They never had a secure nation, a place of their own, but now they are promised and eventually obtain a land to be theirs, a place of their own, home, identity, belonging.

So when Jesus dies on the cross (at a time when the lambs are being killed and prepared for the feast, and because of the numbers in Jerusalem at this time the streets are running red) he dies not merely to deal with our sins but to gain for us a place in the new people of God, the Kingdom come, the table laid for the feast and we are invited, we belong because Jesus is our Passover Lamb who saves us from slavery to sin and the world and frees us into God's people, God's family, God's plan.

The Creed

Do you believe and trust in God the Father, the source of all being and life, the one for whom we exist?
