St Scholastica



Scholastica is a more shadowy figure than her famous brother, St Benedict. She was probably born around the year 480 AD in Nursia, central Italy. At an early age she chose to consecrate herself to God, but probably continued to live at home. When Benedict moved to Monte Cassino she moved to Plombariola, joining (or maybe founding) a nunnery under his direction. As abbess she sought to follow his Rule.

Scholastica died in about the year 543. Benedict had a vision of her soul rising up to heaven and, collecting her body, he had her buried in the tomb prepared for himself.

Scholastica soon became a figure for veneration by all nuns who followed Benedict's Rule.

Sermon

Scholastica was a woman of deep and profound prayer yet we know almost nothing about her except that her entire life was centred around prayer, so let's talk about that aspect of her life. In a book I recently read, I was startled to read the author's opinion that the primary purpose of a church is to teach its members to pray. I'm not sure I completely agree, but the assertion has a great deal of truth in it. The church is a prayer establishment.

Prayer is an encounter with the living God on His terms and in His Spirit. It's the start of a relationship. It's the medium of our relationship. It is our relationship.

It's common to think of prayer as being a stream of words, usually flowing in one direction, but analogies with human conversation and human communication readily tell us that the analogy is extremely limited.

I'll start with two stories. First, think about Peter and Paul who live nearby. Perhaps you know them. They've been neighbours for decades and went to school together. And they see each other every single day, for example when they meet in the paper shop. 'Hello' says Peter. 'Nice day!' and Paul responds, 'Yes, lovely isn't it?' And so they go about their way. One day Peter discovers that he has cancer; by coincidence, the same day Paul discovers that he's won a million on the lottery. They meet at the same counter in the same paper shop. 'Hello' says Peter. 'Nice day!' and Paul responds, 'Yes, lovely isn't it?'

And the other story isn't a story at all, really. It describes Darby and Joan sitting either side of the fire with a mug of cocoa, delighting in each other's company. And they utter not a word.

In our reading from Matthew's Gospel, Jesus tells his disciples to pray. He tells them to first go to their room in silence—in order to avoid all distractions—and to pray according to the template we now call the Lord's Prayer. The commentaries refuse to take the passage seriously; their quibbles centre round whether Jesus calls his Father 'daddy' or not. The doctors argue and the patients die. The point surely is the *relationship* between Jesus and his Father in Heaven. And as just about everything Jesus did was intended as a model for us, we are to recognise our goal as an intense, intimate relationship with God.

No human can tell another human how to pray. I can't, in part because I don't know your schedule, when you feel at your best, etc. And I can't because I'm not you, so I don't know how God wants to reveal Himself to you. But I can suggest a few pointers that will help start the communication and let it develop into a living, deep relationship.

The **first** key to any living relationship depends on our wanting it to work. We must be sincere in wanting it. Peter and Paul did not really want a relationship—that's fine for them, but tragic if they wanted more. We must want a relationship with God. That statement sounds so obvious it would be tragic but for the fact it needs to be stated. You see, when you meet with God, your life changes. You come face to face with reality, perhaps for the very first time. And, as T.S. Eliot once famously said, 'Humankind cannot cope with much reality.' I think that we all know this fact deep down, so many people do not really want to pray because they know that getting close to God is going to cost not less than everything. This explains

why there are so few great saints. But saints are not special people with a special destiny. They are not people given special powers. They are merely people who have a special desire, cultivated by constant immersion in God's love, in prayer.

The **second** key to prayer is a knowledge of who God is. There is nothing wrong with a three-year old who thinks that God has a long white beard and sits on a cloud. There is everything wrong when a teenager has the same image. It is tragic when an adult thinks of such an infantile God. I once talked with a student who said he was an atheist. He did not believe in God and knew that I did. 'Tell me about this God' I said. At the end, I had to say, 'I don't believe in your God either.' It was infantile. No: when we truly want God, we need to seek Him where He is—in truth, as described in Scripture, for example. We pray to a false God if we try to pray to a false image of God. Such prayer becomes nothing less than idolatry, if we are unwilling for our image of God to grow. Of course we cannot truly know God this side of the veil, but as long as we are willing and desiring for our image of God to grow, He will love us into a deeper awareness of His enormous love.

And the **third** way in which we can grow in prayer is to learn who we are. This is the hardest of the lot. But if we have a false image of who we are, then we are unlikely to understand when things happen. A bat travels by a form of sonar, bouncing sound waves from solid objects and listening for their echo. Similarly, a healthy personality gauges whom it by how people respond to its actions, its words, and the like. But an unhealthy personality is unwilling to engage and analyse people's reactions—maybe it fears to find out. Come what may, a refusal to acknowledge whom we are is as fatal to a relationship with God as it is with a spouse. The truth of who we really are can only come about through a ruthless determination to find out the truth, asking, 'Who am I?' That's why people of prayer are humble. That's why the Bible speaks so consistently against the sins of pride and conceit.

We are made to live in God's presence. We are made to live in a close, intimate and loving relationship with God. We cannot do that unless we are honest. We must be honest in wanting a relationship. We must seek a true vision of God, and we must seek to truthful about self. And then long but satisfying growth into prayer can begin.
