

# StSigfrid



Sigfrid was born in England and probably moved to Sweden soon after the year 1000 AD where he conducted extensive missions in Götaland and Svealand. He devoted his life to the Christianisation of Sweden, even during a period of exile in Norway. A turning point occurred when he baptised the first monarch of Sweden, King Olof Skötkonung.

Sigfrid died in Växjö on an unknown date. His burial-place in Växjö became the centre of his cult.

#### Sermon

Many of us are thinking about Lent which starts next week. I wonder what you're planning to give up for Lent. I have a friend who gives up bank robbery each year: it's easy because he never robs banks during the rest of the year. Or are you giving up gossip, I wonder, or slander. Are you chickening out and giving up chocolate—again? Or are you giving up sinning?

Let's start at the beginning. God loves you. God is infinite in power and majesty. That infinity of power and majesty is directed toward the cause of loving you. As the advert says, 'Because you're worth it.' As Christians, that love is expressed in many ways, not least in His willingness to help us change, to get rid of the moral filth of our sin, and to help us become the people we're meant to be. Indeed, it could be said that this amazing love of God is directed, if we let it be, toward making us more like Jesus.

But why does He love us? At the very beginning of the Bible, in Genesis chapter 1, we read that God made humankind to be special. We are made, so we read, in the image and in the likeness of God. Being in His image means that we have a spiritual side. After all, God is a spirit. But the first humans were made also in the likeness of God. They were holy people: pure and sanctified. Their lives were spotless, beautiful and crisp in their perfection.

It all changed. As Romans 3;23 reminds us, 'All have sinned and come short of the glory of God'—even Adam and Eve—so the rest is history. That sin permeates our lives to this day, to the extent that sometimes we are totally unaware of God and His love. We cannot feel Him as a tangible presence when we pray. We are unable to see Him and His works for what they are. In a word, we are *alienated* from God. It's possible to live as though we are independent of God, as though our lives did not need Him.

An ancient Jewish legend says Adam and Eve lived in paradise for forty days before The Fall. It was a popular story at the time of Jesus: perhaps that's why he chose to be tempted for forty days: that's why St Paul calls him the second Adam.

And Jesus' achievement was to show that it *is* possible to live a holy life; it *is* possible to live God's way; it *is* possible to be God's alone, and for our lives to please God in every particular. Now, it seems clear that Jesus was alone in the wilderness, so Jesus himself must have told his disciples what went on in the desert. In his perfection, he judged that the things he saw and heard in the desert were too important to keep to himself. The lessons are for everyone: for you and for me. In effect, these lessons are the key: they contain the secret way to live that will reverse The Fall, that will bring us back into God's favour. That's what the temptation in the desert is about: a template, if you like, of holy living. This is what you must do if you are to thwart the devil, and live God's way,

The devil is very cunning—Scripture calls him 'The father of lies.' He always appears in a different guise. It's rare that, at first sight, we even recognise him for what he is. He usually tells us to do something for a laudable reason. 'Do this and everyone will feel better!' It's true, the road to hell is indeed paved with good intentions—the good intentions of those who did not heed the lessons.

The **first lesson** is to ask God to bless our materialism, to seek things that are not of Him and which, usually, divert our attention from Him. 'Lord, bless my work' which often translates as 'Lord bless my work that I can be rich and thereby remove all responsibility for listening to You.' Rather, we are to feast on the Scriptures. We are to look hard at our lives and ask ourselves those hard questions, 'do I really think more about my standard of living than of you? Do I think about food, money, my home, my anything, than of you?' if we do, we are putting ourselves before God.

The **second lesson** is that we put God to the test, and it simply is not acceptable. 'I don't put God to the test!' we all say, but we do. In out intercessions, we list a series of woes and wait back, looking for God to act. 'Lord, be with so and so who is ill!' we say, then wait back. It doesn't work like that: the usual response to a prayer of intercession is God equipping us to be a solution to a problem: we put Him to the test, waiting for Him to do all the work, and we sit back and pretend we have no responsibilities. If we pray for peace, perhaps we are meant to be instruments of that peace; if we pray for justice, perhaps we are meant to seek and campaign and agitate for that justice ourselves. We must not put God to the test. It's a sin.

And the **third lesson** is to ask God to give us power. As soon as we think we have the answers and others simply must listen to us, we have fallen into this temptation. As soon as we think the opinions of others are less important than ours, we again are tempted and we fall. That's why Jesus tells us repeatedly to be servants and live with a servant mentality. Power is the single most addictive sin there is. Power corrupts; absolute power corrupts absolutely. This sin is so potent

because it always ends with us seeing ourselves as more important than God. It becomes idolatry because we no longer worship God but ourselves. It's the prayer of the self-made man who worships his own creator.

If we are aware of the underlying themes in these temptations, and seek to avoid material acquisitiveness—our own comfort over and against the care of others, the determination for God to do everything for us, and we do not stretch ourselves spiritually, and the grasping of power to elevate ourselves above God—then we will move into the realm of righteousness, holiness, and purity of heart. In effect, we will be renouncing self, and putting God back into His central position in our lives.

So let's return to my first question: what are you giving up for Lent this year: are you going to give up swearing, chocolate or watching too much TV. Will you give up sugar in tea? Or will you try to give up sin and give up self? This Lent, then, will you in effect try to live as Christ did in the wilderness?
