A reading from the Second Book of Moses called Exodus

The Lord said to Moses, 'Come up to me on the mountain, and wait there; and I will give you the tablets of stone, with the law and the commandment, which I have written for their instruction.' So Moses set out with his assistant Joshua, and Moses went up into the mountain of God. To the elders he had said, 'Wait here for us, until we come to you again; for Aaron and Hur are with you; whoever has a dispute may go to them.'

Then Moses went up on the mountain, and the cloud covered the mountain. The glory of the Lord settled on Mount Sinai, and the cloud covered it for six days; on the seventh day he called to Moses out of the cloud. Now the appearance of the glory of the Lord was like a devouring fire on the top of the mountain in the sight of the people of Israel. Moses entered the cloud and went up on the mountain. Second reading

A reading from the Second Letter of St Peter

For we did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we had been eyewitnesses of his majesty. For he received honour and glory from God the Father when that voice was conveyed to him by the Majestic Glory, saying, 'This is my Son, my Beloved, with whom I am well pleased.' We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven, while we were with him on the holy mountain.

So we have the prophetic message more fully confirmed. You will do well to be attentive to this as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts. First of all you must understand this, that no prophecy of scripture is a matter of one's own interpretation, because no prophecy ever came by human will, but men and women moved by the Holy Spirit spoke from God. *2 Peter 1:16-end*

Gospel reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew

When the disciples heard this, they fell to the ground and were overcome by fear. But Jesus came and touched them, saying, 'Get up and do not be afraid.' Sermon

Meeting places with God Our readings this week focus on the significance of two mountain top meetings—Sinai and Transfiguration. Really important events although the theological link can be lost through familiarity.

'Blind faith'? I get so wound up when intelligent people use this as a descriptor for Christians—as if somehow our reason and brains are left behind, but also as if we don't have experiential reasons for believing that God is real and can be known. The Bible tells us of various types of these meetings with the Living God.

The 'cosmic'

In both of these cases from our readings, there is a clear manifestation of the presence of God—the Shekinah presence of cloud and fire and glory.

- In the OT case the people of Israel are introduced to their God not simply through his acts and help but power and majesty. Scares the pants off them! And God establishes them fully as his people, shows his power, gives them the Law, provides them with identity beyond their 400 years of slavery.
- In the case of Jesus, here at the turning point of his ministry he is seen alongside the cloud of glory, his face shining, with links to the past but also to the future new people of God, Jesus is seen to be the centre and the meaning and the sacrifice and heart of all God's purposes for the world.

Cosmic stuff—and important for our understanding of God and his plans for the world. But what of little me, here in Oldham 2000 years later? Does this mean anything for my life beyond the significance of Jesus?

Well mountain tops are not the only meeting places and not all have such a theological oomph! Let's look at some other meetings in the scriptures:

The personal

Particularly in Genesis but also later as well there are a whole series of records of God meeting with people—it almost seems as if altars are popping up everywhere in Palestine. Markers that say 'Here God met me' 'He spoke—and I remember'.

These places become what the Celtic Christians called 'thin places', places where the ordinary becomes extraordinary, where God calls or speaks or challenges or comforts.

Do you have memorable places or times when God did this for you? When he became real not just theoretical—when we realised his presence and love for ourselves?

The ordinary

Thirdly, there is what I'd like to call ordinary meetings. Times that we can take for granted but are actually precious reminders of his presence and love.

Think what it must have been like for the Israelites in the wilderness with the manna coming every day for 40 years. I rather suspect it became usual, expected, normal ('O no mum, not manna again!') but what a shock when they got to the Promised Land and it stopped.

How can we stop taking for granted the common things—reading the Bible, prayer, our services every Sunday—all are places where the ordinary, the common place is actually an opportunity to meet and know and experience the wonder of our Father God's presence and love. Let us look for him to meet us in the midst of our days.

Eucharistic Prayer (prayer E)

The Lord be with you

All and also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

All We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

All It is right to give thanks and praise.

Father, you made the world and love your creation. You gave your Son Jesus Christ to be our Saviour. His dying and rising have set us free from sin and death. And so we gladly thank you, with saints and angels praising you, and saying,

All Holy, holy, holy Lord,
God of power and might,
heaven and earth are full of your glory.
Hosanna in the highest.
Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

On the night before he died he had supper with his friends and, taking bread, he praised you.
