

All Almighty God,

Our Lord Jesus Christ said:

Second reading

A reading from St Paul's Letter to the Romans

What then are we to say was gained by Abraham, our ancestor according to the flesh? For if Abraham was justified by works, he has something to boast about, but not before God. For what does the scripture say? 'Abraham believed God, and it was reckoned to him as righteousness.' Now to one who works, wages are not reckoned as a gift but as something due. But to one who without works trusts him who justifies the ungodly, such faith is reckoned as righteousness.

For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation. For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, 'I have made you the father of many nations')—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. *Romans* 4:1–5, 13–17

Gospel reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John

All Glory to you O Lord.

Now there was a Pharisee named Nicodemus, a leader of the Jews. He came to Jesus by night and said to him, 'Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God; for no one can do these signs that you do apart from the presence of God.' Jesus answered him, 'Very truly, I tell you, no one can see the kingdom of God without being born from above.' Nicodemus said to him, 'How can anyone be born after having grown old? Can one enter a second time into the mother's womb and be born?' Jesus answered, 'Very truly, I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit. What is born of the flesh is flesh, and what is born of the Spirit is spirit. Do not be astonished that I said to you, "You must be born from above." The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit.' Nicodemus said to him, 'How can these things be?' Jesus answered him, 'Are you a teacher of Israel, and yet you do not understand these things? 'Very truly, I tell you, we speak of what we know and testify to what we have seen; yet you do not receive our testimony. If I have told you about earthly things and you do not believe, how can you believe if I tell you about heavenly things? No one has ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the Son of Man. And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world John 3:1-17 might be saved through him.'

Sermon

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen

Last week we looked at Lent through the lens of the Bible: that is, how the idea of a Lenten season of penitence and discipline has its roots in scripture, and how we read that Biblical characters, John the Baptist and Jesus himself used these disciplines in their lives to draw closer to God. Last week's gospel was the story of Jesus spending forty days and nights fasting in the desert, for example.

Today I'm going to take that a little further and think about how we as faithful people of God should see Lent as a time when we ourselves grow closer to God and grow also in holiness. Holiness is a word we might be a little wary of. It might be a word that we wouldn't want to apply to ourselves or our lives. It sounds as though we are expected to live to an impossibly high standard of ethical, moral and spiritual behaviour, one that only Jesus in his sinlessness could meet. Didn't Jesus warn against outward shows of religious practice ... making a big fuss of fasting or praying or almsgiving very publicly so that everyone can see what good Christians we are? Well, yes Jesus did warn against those things, the outward show of piety without the inner humility and purpose of serving God. But Jesus didn't say don't fast or pray or give alms, he just said do these things for the right reason... to know and to serve God. St Paul wrote that we should become more like Christ or have the mind of Christ, and in Matthew's gospel Jesus said 'Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect': as last week's sermon reminded us, a very big ask you may think! In effect, we as Christians are expected to grow in holiness, and Lent is the liturgical season when we are most encouraged to consider the state of our personal holiness ... our spiritual health.

So, as I've said Lent is a time when we are encouraged to examine ourselves; to be honest with God and ourselves about what may need to change in our lives, perhaps to consider where we have compromised too much with worldly attractions and temptations, and to say well actually, that needs some attention, or maybe even that attitude or behaviour I see in myself needs to stop, because it is preventing me from becoming more like Christ and growing in holiness.

But how do the disciplines of Lent help us do this?

Well, I think it's obvious that we start with prayer. We start with that most fundamental of Christian disciplines. We spend time with God. Ideally we spend time with God daily, if we don't already, and we come to God acknowledging our sinfulness and need for forgiveness. We ask God, Godself, to show us what in our lives needs to be amended. That comes with a health warning, because if we do that honestly and openly, then God will respond, and we might not like it. Can I suggest here that if you do come to God in this way, and feel God answering and challenging, you may find it helpful to speak to another Christian you trust about it. We don't have to be alone in our spiritual lives and disciplines. When we come to God in this way, we should also be aware that we need to stop talking, which is very difficult, and try to listen or attend to God. There may not be an obvious voice or sign, but there may be little hints or stray thoughts that point us in the right and holy direction. As I said, prayer is the obvious place to start.

What about fasting, and giving alms? Do they really help us grow in faith and holiness? Fasting can include a number of things, obviously giving up a favourite treat or kind of food spring to mind. It could also mean fasting from gossip, or judgement of others, or impatience ... it can mean being deliberate and loving in response to people and situations that we would usually find annoying, or make us angry. Fasting is the intentional taking on of a spiritual discipline that involves our will and appetite and turning it or them towards God. Making those things which seem bodily and out of our control into holy offerings to God. The giving of alms, so generosity to those in need or to the Church similarly makes us examine our financial priorities ... what we actually spend our money on, and making sure that that too, is made holy and acceptable to God. Lent can be challenging, as you can see.

One phrase that I am praying about this Lent is 'Where your treasure is, there will your heart be also', from Matthew chapter 6. If we take treasure in a wide sense it opens up many possibilities for self-examination. What do I truly love and value? Are they the holy things of God, or have I been tempted by the empty attractions of the world?

I haven't yet mentioned that other fundamental of the Christian life, Bible reading. If we don't read God's word we don't have access to the wisdom of God, and we don't have access to that rich source of prayer and contemplation and knowledge of the Lord. Reading the Bible opens up new understandings of God's will and purposes, and even the most familiar of stories have new depths for us to explore.

I'm going to finish with some words that are read at the Ash Wednesday service:

I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy word.

May you grow in holiness with Lent. Amen

All Give us strength and hear our prayer.

Give us the courage

to give up our selfishness as we live for others,

and to give time, care and comfort to the sick.

[Especially we pray for ...]

May the wounded hands of Jesus bring his healing touch,

and the light of his presence fill their rooms.

Lord, meet us in the silence,

All Give us strength and hear our prayer.

Give us the courage to give up our fear of death and to rejoice with those who have died in faith. [Especially we hold ... in our minds.] May the feet of the risen Lord Jesus, once nailed to the cross, walk alongside the dying and bereaved in their agony, and walk with us and all your Church through death to the gate of glory. Lord, meet us in the silence,

All give us strength and hear our prayer, here and in eternity. Amen.

Eucharistic Prayer (prayer E)

The Lord be with you

All and also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

Father, you made the world and love your creation. You gave your Son Jesus Christ to be our Saviour. His dying and rising have set us free from sin and death. And so we gladly thank you, with saints and angels praising you, and saying,

So, Father, we remember all that Jesus did, in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross.

Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.

Great is the mystery of faith:

All Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Lord of all life, help us to work together for that day when your kingdom comes and justice and mercy will be seen in all the earth.

Look with favour on your people, gather us in your loving arms and bring us with all the saints to feast at your table in heaven.

Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory are yours, O loving Father, for ever and ever.
