John Donne



John Donne was born in about the year 1571. He went up to Oxford when he was fourteen, studied further at Cambridge, and perhaps on the Continent. He was brought up a Roman Catholic, was sceptical about all religion as a child, but discovered his Christian faith in the Church of England.

He was eventually ordained and later became Dean of St Paul's Cathedral. Much of his cynicism dissolved and he became a strong advocate for the discerning of Christian vocation, and in particular affirming his own vocation as a priest, loving and loved by the crucified Christ.

The people of London flocked to his sermons. He died on this day in the year 1631. His love-poetry and religious poems took on a renewed life in the twentieth century; and his place both as a patristic scholar and as a moral theologian are confirmed by his prolific writings and the publication of his sermons.

Gospel reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John

All Glory to you O Lord.

Jesus said, 'If I testify about myself, my testimony is not true. There is another who testifies on my behalf, and I know that his testimony to me is true. You sent messengers to John, and he testified to the truth. Not that I accept such human testimony, but I say these things so that you may be saved. He was a burning and shining lamp, and you were willing to rejoice for a while in his light. But I have a testimony greater than John's. The works that the Father has given me to complete, the very works that I am doing, testify on my behalf that the Father has sent me. And the Father who sent me has himself testified on my behalf. You have never heard his voice or seen his form, and you do not have his word abiding in you, because you do not believe him whom he has sent.

'You search the scriptures because you think that in them you have eternal life; and it is they that testify on my behalf. Yet you refuse to come to me to have life. I do not accept glory from human beings. But I know that you do not have the love of God in you. I have come in my Father's name, and you do not accept me; if another comes in his own name, you will accept him. How can you believe when you accept glory from one another and do not seek the glory that comes from the one who alone is God? Do not think that I will accuse you before the Father; your accuser is Moses, on whom you have set your hope. If you believed Moses, you would believe me, for he wrote about me. But if you do not believe what he wrote, how will you believe what I say?'

Sermon

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Have you heard the expression 'No man is an island'? It's the first line of a poem by John Donne, and it continues the words, 'No man is an island, Entire of itself'.

Gendered language aside (by 'man', I take Donne to include women too), it's

actually quite a powerful statement. It's a powerful statement in general, but in the context of the Church it speaks volumes. This isn't one of Donne's overtly religious poems but, as a Christian who wrote poetry, it is possible to read Christianity into what he wrote, even in the more 'secular' poems. As Christians, as the Church, we understand ourselves to be part of a community, much more than a community in fact, we understand ourselves to be members of God's family.

This phrase can seem like a platitude at times. Yes, the Church is the family of God, but so what? We may call ourselves sisters and brothers, but what difference does that make to me or to you? Well, go back to those short lines from Donne, 'No man [No one] is an island, Entire in itself': turn those words into an image of the Church. The Church is the people of God gathered for worship, or scattered in their various callings throughout the week, and without each of those people the Church is diminished and degraded, and in turn each person of God is diminished without the others. We can only be ourselves and live as people of faith if we are in communion with other people of faith. One of the joys of the Church is that it is properly catholic—that it includes people from every and all backgrounds, places, ages, abilities, social position ... you name it and that person has a place in the Church, God's family.

This statement doesn't mean that we have to get on with everybody in the Church, or even like or approve of them, but it does mean we are duty bound to love them and when necessary, forgive them, and let them love and forgive us. It also means that we can't be Christians in isolation. We are not 'islands', and we are not 'Entire' or complete without others. Neither does it mean we need only associate with other Christians: we are called to be out in the world being the light of Christ to everyone we meet. Being the light of Christ in the world is a challenging task for many reasons, but that is what we as Christians are told to be.

Is it really possible to keep that light shining brightly and confidently in the world, in our daily lives, if we don't feel ourselves to be supported and loved by our sisters and brothers in the Church? And equally, do our sisters and brothers in the Church not need our support and prayers as they take the light of Christ into the world? We are only 'Entire of [ourselves]' if we are part of something bigger, the Church, and the Church is not 'Entire of itself' if we are not participating in gathered worship and prayer.

I've sometimes heard people say, 'I'm a Christian, I believe in God but I don't go to Church', well, NO, a Christian is someone who values and loves other Christians and wants to be with them whether we like them or not. A Christian is someone who values and understands their need of a visible gathering together of God's people, God's family, and knows that if they or someone else isn't there in Church

then they and the Church are not 'Entire'. There are of course perfectly good reasons why people are unable to meet together such as illness, infirmity, etc., but beyond that we are in danger of becoming barren and dreary 'islands' if we don't connect to the mainland the Church regularly. The Church is where the 'Communion of Saints' is formed, grows, learns, and meets with the living God. This is what we take with us as we walk out of the Church door, and we know that we're not alone in the task of Christian living because the sisters and brothers we have been worshipping and praying with are doing the same. A Christian can't be an 'island' and can never become 'Entire' or complete without other Christians.
