Gospel reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John

All Glory to you O Lord.

Jesus said, 'Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers.' Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them.

So again Jesus said to them, 'Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly.

John 10:1-10

This is the Gospel of the Lord

Sermon

Today is widely known as Good Shephard Sunday because each year the liturgy on the Fourth Sunday of Easter is taken from different sections of John 10, where Jesus speaks of himself as the 'good shepherd' Today we focus on the first part of the charter, verses 1–10. There are two version:

- I am the *gate* for the sheep (10:7) for example the New International Version
- I am the *door* of the sheep (10:7) for example the New King James Version

In most of the modern Bible translations it reads as 'the gate'. More traditional versions such as the King James Version, the term is translated as 'the door'. It really isn't a contradiction as the context is the same. A gate or door has two main purposes which are described in the passage. One purpose is to keep people out. At night I'm sure we all lock the doors to our houses. In this way a door is used to keep people out. It keeps out people from wandering into our houses, people who should not be there. The same is true with a gate. At the end of my garden, we have a gate. Now, if you pass my house, that gate will be closed, locked. Why? Because we have a big dog who, we want to keep safe. And that's the real reason we lock our doors as well, isn't it? It's to protect the people inside.

It's believed the shepherds, back in the Bible times used to put the sheep in a pen at night. This is what this passage refers to. It could be a cave or more often it would simply be an enclosure built somewhere in the field. It would be a circular enclosure built with stones or made from branches and it would be completely closed except for one narrow entrance where the sheep went in and out. Usually, the entrance would not have a gate across it but would simply be a gap. But at night when the sheep were in the pen, the shepherd himself would lie across the entrance. So, the shepherd himself became the gate. By lying across the entrance, the shepherd could keep close watch on the sheep and protect them from wild animals or sheep thieves.

A door or gate is different to a wall. A wall would be more effective at keeping something out so if this is what Jesus was driving at then he may have said 'I am the wall'. But a gate's main purpose is to allow people to pass through it. It opens to yield a gap in the wall, a legitimate way through. If someone wants to come into your house, you expect them to come in through the door, wouldn't you? You wouldn't expect a visitor to climb in through a window. If someone came into your house through the window you would probably call the police. The window is not the proper way into the house, the right way in is through the door.

Jesus is the gate (or door)

In the preceding chapter of John's Gospel, Jesus is talking to the Pharisees about being blind. And the Pharisees seem to prove his point when Jesus gives them this illustration and once again, they just don't understand what he means. So, Jesus spells it out to them and in verse 7 says 'I am the gate' or in the KJV 'I am the door'. But a gate or door *to what?* Jesus makes this clear too, in verse 9 where he says, 'Whoever enters through me will be saved'. So, it doesn't take a genius to work out that Jesus is the gate to our salvation. This is what John has been trying to let us know all the way through this gospel.

The Jews had long understood that the Messiah would bring salvation. The coming of the Messiah was something they looked forward to. They thought of course that the Messiah would be a mighty warrior that would get rid of the Romans. There are several prophecies in the Old Testament that refer to the Messiah. So, it seems that from the Jewish point of view, the title of 'Messiah' was the key. Whoever held the post of Messiah was therefore the gate to salvation. By saying he was the gate, Jesus was also revealing himself as the Messiah. His references to those climbing in another way, who he calls thieves and robbers refers to the false Messiahs that came before and after him. There were several who claimed to be the Messiah, but they were false. They had no interest in the sheep for a start; they were only interested in their own fame and glory. But perhaps more importantly, it is God who decides who fills this post. Verse 3 says 'The watchman opens the gate for him'. God the father appointed Jesus to be the Saviour of the world. He is the 'anointed one' and therefore the one and only true Messiah and the only way to salvation is to go through him.

There are plenty of people who still believe that you can get to heaven by some other means. One of the most popular views is that you can get to heaven by good works. But the Bible tells us clearly that no one hits the standards that God requires. For example, Romans 3:23 says, 'For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God'. Therefore, none of us will ever be able to make it on good deeds alone. Another view is that because God is a God of love, he will simply let everyone in. I'm afraid that isn't true either. Again, the Bible tells us that not everyone will get in, in fact it goes as far as to say only a few find the way in (Matthew 7:13-14).

Enter through the gate.

So, we know that Jesus is the gate. The only way for us to be saved is to go through Jesus, he alone is the door to salvation, he alone is the gateway.

Have you found the gate yet? And if you have found the gate, have you entered through it? 'Entering Heaven' means going *through* Jesus, which means believing

in him. If you have accepted Jesus as your saviour then you can be certain of your salvation. If you haven't then, why not: what is holding you back, what is stopping you from going through the gate? Jesus is the ONLY way to be saved. God's desire is for you to be part of the sheepfold. To those who believe in him, Jesus opens the gate. Through the gate is green pasture, a safe place in Jesus' sheepfold. Enter through the gate and in Jesus words, you will 'have life, and have it to the full'.

If you're not sure how to go through the gate, then let's talk about it, let's pray about it, talk to anyone you know who has made that decision to follow Jesus. Last week we talked about not feeling Jesus is those dark times, about not recognising his voice and the companion who is vaguely familiar, today, I'm talking and asking you today, to recognise that voice and accept the invitation. Because going through this gate gives life, and not just life after death, but life for today. That is God's desire for us, but it can only be achieved by going through the gate.
