

John and Charles Wesley



Aldersgate Day is celebrated on May 24 to commemorate the day in 1738 when John Wesley (image, left) first experienced assurance of his salvation. According to his journal, he reluctantly attended a group meeting that evening on Aldersgate Street, in London. As he heard a reading from Luther's Preface to the Epistle to the Romans, he felt his 'heart strangely warmed.' He said that at about 8:45 pm 'While he [St Paul] was describing the change which God works in the heart through faith in Christ, I felt my heart strangely warmed. I felt I *did* trust in Christ, Christ alone for salvation; and an assurance was given *me* that He had taken away my sins, *even mine*, and saved *me* from the law of sin and death.' In fact, Charles Wesley (right) also had a conversion experience a mere few days before.

The brothers were gifted organisers and communicators and were soon sharing this message of the assurance of salvation available to all. After their death, their 'methodical holiness movement' became a new denomination—the Methodist Church.

A reading from the Second Letter of St Peter

Simeon Peter, a servant and apostle of Jesus Christ, to those who have received a faith as precious as ours through the righteousness of our God and Saviour Jesus Christ:

May grace and peace be yours in abundance in the knowledge of God and of Jesus our Lord. His divine power has given us everything needed for life and godliness, through the knowledge of him who called us by his own glory and goodness. Thus he has given us, through these things, his precious and very great promises, so that through them you may escape from the corruption that is in the world because of lust, and may become participants in the divine nature. For this very reason, you must make every effort to support your faith with goodness, and goodness with knowledge, and knowledge with self-control, and self-control with endurance, and endurance with godliness, and godliness with mutual affection, and mutual affection with love. For if these things are yours and are increasing among you, they keep you from being ineffective and unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. For anyone who lacks these things is short-sighted and blind, and is forgetful of the cleansing of past sins. Therefore, brothers and sisters, be all the more eager to

confirm your call and election, for if you do this, you will never stumble. For in this way, entry into the eternal kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ will be richly provided for you. *2 Peter 1:1–11*

Gospel reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark All **Glory to you O Lord.**

One of the scribes came near and heard them disputing with one another and, seeing that [Jesus] answered them well, he asked him, 'Which commandment is the first of all?' Jesus answered, 'The first is, "Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength." The second is this, "You shall love your neighbour as yourself." There is no other commandment greater than these.' The scribe said to him, 'You are right, Teacher; you have truly said that "he is one, and besides him there is no other"; and "to love him with all the heart, and with all the understanding, and with all the strength", and "to love one's neighbour as oneself"—this is much more important than all whole burnt-offerings and sacrifices.' When Jesus saw that he answered wisely, he said to him, 'You are not far from the kingdom of God.' After that no one dared to question him. *Mark 17:11–19*

All Praise to you O Christ.

Sermon

I'm going to die. I don't yet know when, but I will. One day, this mortal body will cease to function and my spirit will separate from the fleshly bits. And I'll die. When I do die, God will have a choice: he can keep my soul alive forever in His presence or He can evict my soul so that it never sees Him again. It's frighteningly simple. In a sense that's His choice, His prerogative. But in a very real sense, it's not His choice but mine. If I want to live forever with God, then (to use St Peter's words), 'I have

to make my election sure' (2 Peter 1:10). It's my job to fulfil the criteria. It's me who fills in the application form for Heaven.

In our Gospel reading, we hear the story of a man coming to Jesus and asking which commandment is the most important. Without a moment's hesitation, Jesus recites the first commandment: 'love the Lord your God with all your hart, all your soul, all your mind and all your strength.' This love is not the payment for eternal life, but an expression of our love for a God who offers us eternal life. The problem is that so many people insist that eternal life is free and, by extension, seem to be saying they deserve it. It's mine!

And it's also a sensible commandment: if God is not our everything while we live here on earth, then we may not be ready for spending eternity with Him. Imagine spending eternity with someone we've not met before.

St Peter speaks about eternal life quite often in his two epistles. It's as though eternal life is a preoccupation with him. He thinks about it a lot. He really wants to be there. It's his goal, his constant objective. It's as though the thought of Heaven is there before his eyes all the time. But I wonder if you noticed that he doesn't think of Heaven in ordinary terms: he uses a very odd phrase for Heaven: he says, we can participate in the divine nature. That is, living forever in the Heaven is an eternal absence of sin, an eternal absence of pain, or suffering. We share God's nature.

This is all so wonderful, such a gift that we are to make sure we get there. It is too important to be left to chance. St Peter is so aware of the awesome responsibility—am I saved? Am I not?—that he puts together a tick-list of criteria. I wonder if you filled out a tax form recently, or a form to claim some form of Government benefit? You know the sort of thing: 'When you have completed question 3, move on to page 11'. St Peter's mind is moving in the same way. The overall objective is to love God with all our heart, all our soul, all our mind and all our strength. That is the way to Heaven. Easier said than done. The problem is that humans are made up of humanity. We cannot straightforwardly say to God, 'Here: have it all!' We have the habit of keeping bits back, keeping them for ourselves. Worse, we can be unaware of bits of our lives that are not God's.

Think of a Russian Doll, or an onion, with successive layers. We are like that doll. As soon as we convert the outer layer, giving it to God, we need to move to the next layer in. Part of the subconscious, maybe. Part of our inner psychological makeup, perhaps. And we need to convert that too. In fact, giving our lives to God is a continual process of conversion: the outer layers are converted and given over to God, but the inner bits are still atheistic, selfish, *mine!* The challenge of the

Christian life is to get to these inner layers, inner bits of our lives and make them God's as well as the outer, visible bits.

So, St Peter has put together a tick list, a form, to work through as we grow, as we progressively give our lives to God, with the aim that we love him with all our hearts, all our soul, all our mind and all our strength.

He starts with faith: faith in God. Faith in his power and goodness. And we are to add to our faith goodness. We ask God for it because Scripture assures us that we can have no goodness of our own. We are to look out for ways to show the goodness of God. And another shell of the Russian Doll is given over to God. We Add to goodness knowledge—knowledge of God. The scriptures assure us that to know God is to love, and to love is to know Him. We therefore ask to have love. God is love, so we are asking for God Himself in our lives. And another shell is converted, given over.

And to knowledge we add self-control, which is not surprising, really because self-control is a fruit of the spirit. So we need to ask the Holy Spirit of God to come in, enter our lives in power. We will need that self-control because the devil will now realise that we mean business, and really want to evade his clutches. We ask for God, and another inner layer of self is converted. From now on the pace alters, and we add perseverance, It can be hard work, changing inside, It can be painful so we need to beware of stopping, resting too early, because the goal is to give everything to God. We persevere, casting off sloth and self interest, and another layer is converted—given over to God, and we get closer to the core of self.

To perseverance, we add godliness, and to godliness we add brotherly kindness, and to brotherly kindness we add love. And God is love. We are converted, bit-bybit, thereby increasingly fulfilling the first and greatest of the commandments. As St Peter says, my brother and sisters, be all the more eager to make your calling and election sure. For if do these things, you will never fall, and you will receive a rich welcome into the eternal kingdom.

We celebrate today the day when John Wesley, probably the greatest evangelist this country has ever produced. He made it his duty to tell people they needed God to reach heaven, because he knew that each person he entered would one day die, and God would decide their eternal destiny. Had they loved God with all their heart, their soul, their mind and all their strength? Did they love God first or self?

And all these years later, Wesley still speaks to us. St Paul still speaks to us. Jesus still speaks to us. Make you calling and election sure. Love God with everything. And love forever with God!
