First reading

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

When the day of Pentecost had come, the disciples were all together in one place. Suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked, 'Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs—in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power.'

All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, 'What does this mean?' But others sneered and said, 'They are filled with new wine.' But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, 'Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel: "In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams. Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy. And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist. The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day. Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved".'

Second reading

A reading from St Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians

I want you to understand that no one speaking by the Spirit of God ever says 'Let Jesus be cursed!' and no one can say 'Jesus is Lord' except by the Holy Spirit.

Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.

For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.

Sermon

Today we consider what Pentecost is about and its importance for us. The Spirit is the least celebrated and understood part of the Trinity in my opinion—we often mention him in passing while great and glorious things are spoken of Father and Son. Yet he is a precious and important part of who we are as the people of the risen Christ.

What is the significance of the feast to the Jews of Jesus time?

We start with how the Jews of Jesus' day thought of it.

For them it had great significance for they celebrated on this day becoming God's chosen people, it's the day to celebrate the Giving of the Torah since it is seven weeks after the crossing of the Red Sea (the whole Passover and Exodus thingy) that they arrived at Mount Sinai and received the Law. At Sinai, God's presence is marked in fire and cloud—his majesty revealed. So it is seen as the Marriage Day between God and his people—a covenant is made between them sealed with the Gift of the Law. Interestingly the Book of Ruth is read, in which Ruth willingly accepts Jewish life and marries in to the community of God's people so full of themes of belonging and joining and becoming

What happened to Jesus' followers on that first Pentecost?

From Luke's witness at the end of his gospel, we know that the disciples have been meeting in the Temple courts to worship and be involved. At 9:00 am on Pentecost morning, the place to be for all Jews in Jerusalem is the Temple where the first sacrifices of the feast are to be offered. I'm convinced this is where they are—and it makes the successful reaching of thousands of Jews all the easier as what happens next happens in full sight of everybody.

So what does happen? Hold on to your seats! God publicly makes for himself a new chosen people but instead of a new Torah (new rules to live by) he gives to them all the Spirit of God. Note the timings—seven weeks after the saving act of Jesus that rescues his people from sin and shame comes the giving of the Spirit on Mount Zion (the Temple Mount). Here God's presence is manifested in wind and fire paralleling Mount Sinai but this time welcomed with gladness and not fear. This is the Marriage Day of the new people of God—a new Covenant is made between them and God sealed with the gift of the Spirit. Note the Jewish habit of bride and bridegroom celebrating under a banner at their feast (seen on our trip to Israel still being practised, the Song of Songs phrase 'his banner over me is love' echoes this practise); and I can't help thinking of the flames of fire resting on the disciple as being God's banner over them. But there is more in the significance of the fire—

the 40-year journey of the Jews through Sinai is marked by God's presence leading his people—a pillar of cloud by day and of fire by night. And Peter points his hearer not to Ruth (though she is still relevant) but to the prophet Joel who proclaims the coming day when the Spirit of God will be for all the Covenant people not just the 'expert' or the leader—and Peter proclaims that that day has come.

What about us, here and now?

We are the people of the New Covenant, the new relationship with God won for us by our amazing Saviour. We are the people of the Spirit not the Law, the people of Mt Zion not Mt Sinai. Our birth-right is the presence, the gifting, the filling of the Spirit—yet so often we make do with the old ways of focusing on our failures rather than on our Saviour, considering ourselves unworthy when his is worthy, and making do without taping in to the resources God has given us by his Presence within.

Let us reclaim our birthright and live in the Spirit.

The Liturgy of the Sacrament

Eucharistic Prayer (prayer E)

The Lord be with you

He is the one who has gone before us, who calls us to be united in prayer as were his disciples in the upper room while they awaited his promised gift, the life-giving Spirit of Pentecost. Therefore all creation yearns with eager longing as angels and archangels sing the endless hymn of praise:

this is my blood of the new covenant,

Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

So, Father, we remember all that Jesus did, in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross.

Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.

Great is the mystery of faith:

All Christ has died.
Christ is risen.
Christ will come again.

Lord of all life, help us to work together for that day when your kingdom comes and justice and mercy will be seen in all the earth.

Look with favour on your people, gather us in your loving arms and bring us with all the Spirit-filled saints to feast at your table in heaven.

Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory are yours, O loving Father, for ever and ever.
