

First reading

A reading from the book of the Prophet Isaiah

Ho, everyone who thirsts, come to the waters; and you that have no money, come, buy and eat! Come, buy wine and milk without money and without price. Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread, and your labor for that which does not satisfy? Listen carefully to me, and eat what is good, and delight yourselves in rich food. Incline your ear, and come to me; listen, so that you may live. I will make with you an everlasting covenant, my steadfast, sure love for David. See, I made him a witness to the peoples, a leader and commander for the peoples. See, you shall call nations that you do not know, and nations that do not know you shall run to you, because of the Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, for he has glorified you.

Seek the Lord while he may be found, call upon him while he is near; let the wicked forsake their way, and the unrighteous their thoughts; let them return to the Lord, that he may have mercy on them, and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon.

For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the Lord. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts. For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven, and do not return there until they have watered the earth, making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and bread to the eater, so shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and succeed in the thing for which I sent it. Second reading

A reading from St Paul's Letter to the Romans

There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus has set you free from the law of sin and of death. For God has done what the law, weakened by the flesh, could not do: by sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh, and to deal with sin, he condemned sin in the flesh, so that the just requirement of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not according to the flesh but according to the Spirit. For those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh, but those who live according to the Spirit set their minds on the things of the Spirit. To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. For this reason the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law—indeed it cannot, and those who are in the flesh cannot please God. But you are not in the flesh; you are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him.

But if Christ is in you, though the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you. *Romans* 8:1–11

Gospel reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew

All Glory to you O Lord.

Jesus went out of the house and sat beside the sea. Such great crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat there, while the whole crowd stood on the beach. And he told them many things in parables, saying: 'Listen! A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seeds fell on the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. But when the sun rose, they were scorched; and since they had no root, they withered away. Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Let anyone with ears listen!. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light.'

He continued, 'Hear then the parable of the sower. When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what is sown in the heart; this is what was sown on the path. As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is the one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy; yet such a person has no root, but endures only for a while, and when trouble or persecution arises on account of the word, that person immediately falls away. As for what was sown among thorns, this is the one who hears the word, but the cares of the world and the lure of wealth choke the word, and it yields nothing. But as for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty.'

Sermon

I'm sure we all remember Jesus' parables from Sunday School, in Church and reading our Bibles but, why did Jesus teach and preach using parables? Today, we are going to start at the end, after giving the parable, which is recorded in three of the Gospels (all the Gospels but John's) and, before He had explained its meaning, Jesus' disciples asked him, 'Why do you speak to the people in parables?'

Jesus answered by quoting Isaiah, concerning people who have eyes but do not see and ears but do not hear. In telling the parables, Jesus was bringing pressure upon his listeners, to either open their spiritual eyes and ears and be enlightened, or to shut their eyes and ears tighter and be condemned.

The parables not only make people think, but they also make people choose. They bring people out of the grey area into the clearly black or white. The parables were a kind 'sorting fork' for Jesus, by which he was able to separate the wheat from the chaff. Jesus based His parables on the customs at that time. In the case of the Parable of the Sower, farming was something His disciples knew and would be familiar with.

Today we have heard The Parable of the Sower. Just a quick summery/recap, Jesus' story is about a farmer who sows seed indiscriminately. Some seed fall on different types of land ... on the path (wayside) with no soil, some on rocky ground with little soil, some on soil which contains thorns, and some on good soil. On the path, the seed is taken away; in the second and third soils, the seed fails to produce a crop; but when it falls on good soil, it grows and yields thirty-, sixty-, or a hundred-fold.

Sowers sow seeds hoping for and wanting a crop. Sowers want to see growth. They want a harvest. Isn't that what we want when our plant seeds? In early Spring when we plant seeds in our window pots or wildflower garden, we hope that by Summer they will have grown, and we will have beautiful plants or flowers to admire.

The same applies to us in terms of ourselves, when I give myself to another, invest my life in a relationship, or offer my time, energy, effort, and love, I do it with the intention and hope that something will come of it. I want my seeds and their soil to be fruitful.

I can't imagine anyone sowing seeds knowing they won't grow, knowing that they'll be eaten by birds, fall among rocks, or be choked by thorns. Yet, that's exactly what the Sower does in our Gospel reading, these seeds are scattered indiscriminately.

Why does the Sower do that? It doesn't make sense and that makes me think there is more to this parable than we usually see or hear. Today we are going explore—God as the Sower and the seed is his word!

Sometimes when it comes to our lives and hearing the word, we can be much more like the hard, or rocky or thorny soil than the good soil. I'm sure we all wish we could pray more and pray better. We all wish that we gave more to the church, more time and money. We all wish we could share our faith more easily, that we could tell our friends and neighbours just why this place means so much to us. But we don't feel like good soil ... we can see and feel in ourselves what we know to be failure. We can see and feel the rocks, the thorns, and the hardness within us.

When exploring this parable, we can get caught up in the business of the seeds and the soil. Imagining the details of where we fit, and we can be hit by the reality of what it means to be soil, good or otherwise.

But today we are going say it isn't about seeds or soil. Jesus gives us a clue when he says, 'Hear then the parable of the Sower'. This parable is not about soil: *it is about the Sower*.

God the Sower. God who can seem extreme, messy, and all over the place when his seeds end up everywhere. When Jesus explains this parable, he says that the parable is about the Sower. The one who owns and works the fields, the one who owns and plants the seeds. This parable is about God who is willing to see that there is possibility and opportunity, even in the rocky, hard, shallow and thorny soil. Even knowing that the seeds may not grow in poor conditions, God scatters and plants them anyway.

This parable shows a God who declares that hard packed soil, the rocky soil and even the thorny soil, all the soils, are acceptable. All these soils are good enough to sow. Good enough for the Word to be scattered on.

The Sower is scattering seed, knowing that it probably will not grow, but seeing the possibility that it might. This parable shows us is God, who scatters grace, mercy, and love in all directions. This parable shows God who has decided to scatter good soil but also on the rocky, the shallow, and the thorny soil. We are shown here a God who wants the Word of the Kingdom to be heard everywhere and anywhere. A God who shows us that we are cherished and loved, imperfections and all.

This sowing God is showing us that the lenses of good and bad soil that we see the world through are not how the Sower sees. The productivity of the soil does not determine were the Sower sows. Whether are good and holy, or if we are hard, rocky or thorny... it doesn't determine God loves.

'Listen!' Jesus says, 'a Sower went to sow ...' and with those first few words gives us the good news. The good news that God has decided to love us, and give us His word, even if we don't feel good enough to receive it. Because God's love is given indiscriminately, he has declared it and given it—FOR US. Amen.
