

St Bartholomew



It has long been assumed that Bartholomew is the same as Nathanael, though it is not certain. The gospels speak of Philip bringing Nathanael to Jesus and calling him 'an Israelite worthy of the name'. He is also present beside the Sea of Galilee at the resurrection. Although he seems initially a somewhat cynical man, he did recognise Jesus for who he was and proclaimed him as Son of God and King of Israel.

By very ancient tradition, soon after Pentecost, Bartholemew went to Armenia, then to India, where he was a powerful evangelist. A much later tradition says he was martyred by being flayed alive, which explains why (in a great many representations) he carries his own skin and a broad flaying knife.

Gospel reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke

A dispute arose among the disciples as to which one of them was to be regarded as the greatest. But Jesus said to them, 'The kings of the Gentiles lord it over them; and those in authority over them are called benefactors. But not so with you; rather the greatest among you must become like the youngest, and the leader like one who serves. For who is greater, the one who is at the table or the one who serves? Is it not the one at the table? But I am among you as one who serves.

'You are those who have stood by me in my trials; and I confer on you, just as my Father has conferred on me, a kingdom, so that you may eat and drink at my table in my kingdom, and you will sit on thrones judging the twelve tribes of Israel.' *Luke 22:24–30*

This is the Gospel of the Lord

Sermon

Today's reading from Isaiah starts with the chilling first line, 'Bring forth the people who are blind, yet have eyes, who are deaf, yet have ears'. The centre of the complaint hinges on the sentence, 'I, I am the Lord, and besides me there is no saviour'. God is complaining that some people choose not to perceive Him as He truly is. Similarly, today's Gospel shows the disciples arguing about which of them is the greatest, so again it describes people misunderstanding, maybe deliberately. Taken together, these two readings imply that ignorance is no defence because everyone should be able to discern the nature of God.

This complaint seems rather unfair because God is a spirit and is therefore invisible to the human eye and inaudible to the human ear. Most of us struggle to hear God in prayer and to connect with Him clearly. Before the events in today's Gospel passage took place, the disciples will have known a great deal about Jesus and heard him talking about himself as 'Messiah' and as 'Son of Man', yet it's clear they completely failed to understand him. Discerning the true nature of God is difficult. We all struggle.

In fact, it's a dilemma and can feel a bit like a Catch-22 situation: we grow in faith by listening, but we cannot listen properly until we've grown in faith.

We need to remember that God made us for Himself and He willingly tells us about Himself. He therefore wants us to grow in faith which will at the same time help us to grow in the ability to hear, see, and understand Him in a spiritual sense. Perhaps in our own responses to this dilemma, we could pray the words of St Peter when trying (and failing) to walk on water, 'Lord I believe—help thou my unbelief!' St Peter is using the small amount of faith that he does have to seek a greater faith.

It's at this point that we must re-read the passage from Isaiah. God's real complaint is not against those who don't know Him but against those who refuse to seek Him and those who untruthfully say they do know Him.

There are many reasons why people say they know God when they don't: it's often because they know that He will ask them to change. Maybe, like the disciples in today's Gospel reading, they want others to be impressed. Maybe others more are lazy and do not want to put in the spiritual effort of growing to become holy. But the simple statement 'But I'm only human' simply will not do because all the great saints were merely human yet used their lives (which were often quite short) to discern God.

It's probably time to re-read today's Collect and take it to ourselves: God 'gave to the apostle Bartholomew grace truly to believe'. Perhaps we need to ask God to give *us* the grace truly to believe—really growing in genuine faith. So let's start asking right now.
