First reading

A reading from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah

Listen to me, you that pursue righteousness, you that seek the Lord. Look to the rock from which you were hewn, and to the quarry from which you were dug. Look to Abraham your father and to Sarah who bore you; for he was but one when I called him, but I blessed him and made him many. For the Lord will comfort Zion; he will comfort all her waste places, and will make her wilderness like Eden, her desert like the garden of the Lord; joy and gladness will be found in her, thanksgiving and the voice of song.

A reading from St Paul's Letter to the Romans

I appeal to you therefore, brothers and sisters, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect. For by the grace given to me I say to everyone among you not to think of yourself more highly than you ought to think, but to think with sober judgment, each according to the measure of faith that God has assigned. For as in one body we have many members, and not all the members have the same function, so we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another. We have gifts that differ according to the grace given to us: prophecy, in proportion to faith; ministry, in ministering; the teacher, in teaching; the exhorter, in exhortation; the giver, in generosity; the leader, in diligence; the compassionate, in cheerfulness.

Gospel reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew

All Glory to you O Lord.

When Jesus came into the district of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, 'Who do people say that the Son of Man is?' And they said, 'Some say John the Baptist, but others Elijah, and still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets.' He said to them, 'But who do you say that I am?' Simon Peter answered, 'You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God.' And Jesus answered him, 'Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father in heaven. And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven.' Then he sternly ordered the disciples not to tell anyone that he was the Messiah.

Matthew 16:13–20

This is the Gospel of the Lord

Sermon

We have three readings about rocks. In the first, Isaiah tells the chosen people that they should, 'Look to the rock from which you were hewn, and to the quarry from which you were dug'. He wants them to remember their heritage and tradition as the chosen people of God. They should therefore *live* the covenant between God and Moses, celebrate that He led them from slavery to freedom, and therefore customise everything they ever do to demonstrate that God loves them and desires them.

In today's Gospel, Jesus is speaking to Peter and tells him that he is like a rock and any true Church will be built on a foundation of people like him—he means people with a first-hand knowledge of Jesus as the Christ, the Son of the Living God.

And the reading from St Romans talks about sacrifices, which surely implies an image of a stone altar.

Combining these three rock-related themes suggests that we are the most truly the people of God when we allow Him to build His Church on us, and do so in a way that demonstrates that we've gone back to basics, the quarry from which we were hewn—a first-hand faith like that of Peter. The church will then delight in sacrifice in the way that God first intended.

A word of warning before we go further. The word 'sacrifice' has a very broad range of meanings, and some of them are not very useful to the modern ear. It can

mean killing, say, a sheep or goat. The implied meaning here is the sacrifice of thanksgiving. The Law of Moses dictates a very wide range of sacrifices, a great many of which are responses to the goodness of God. For example, remember how Mary and Joseph go to the Jerusalem Temple to say 'Thank you' when Jesus is born. That sacrifice is often spiritualised, so this time think of Psalm 27, 'One thing I ask from the Lord, this only do I seek: that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to gaze on the beauty of the Lord and to seek him in his Temple ... I will sacrifice with shouts of joy; I will sing and make music to the Lord' (vv. 4, 6).

We are to remember the quarry from which we were hewn. Isaiah was talking to the chosen people, whose defining story is surely Moses when he led the chosen people from slavery to freedom, from Egypt to the Promised Land. They are to remember that they were slaves and are now free. And God provided for everything they could need on that journey from slavery to freedom. God gave them the Law and Commandments as a way of reminding them, and so ensuring they stayed free. They forgot and were enslaved again, which is why Isaiah talked to them as recorded in the first of today's reading. The people kept forgetting which is why both St Peter and St Paul take the story of Moses and created a new, spiritual metaphor out of it: the new chosen people, those who follow Jesus, have moved from slavery to sin and inherited the freedom to be the people that God always wanted.

It's time to splice these themes together. God wants to create a Church, a collective of the redeemed. The true Church includes people like you and like me ordinary people with the extraordinary task of being Christlike and holy. The Church (when it is being faithful) follows the original desires of the Lord Jesus and is built on foundations like the first disciples ... so people like Peter.

In today's Gospel, we see Peter moving from a secondhand faith to a firsthand faith. He is moving slavery to sin to the freedom that comes through knowing the Lord Jesus as the Son of the living God, as Messiah. He's not there yet and will need to wait until Pentecost for the power that enabled his transformation, but God has already started building His Church on him. And once the Holy Spirit was properly living within him, he became unstoppable. Nothing was too much; he would do anything for his Lord and master. To use the phrase from St Paul, he was 'Presenting his body as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God'. everything he did for Jesus was an act of 'spiritual worship.' And we must do so too.

This 'sacrifice of praise' is not the saccharin 'count your blessings' of sentimental Victorian piety. Quite the opposite. It's asking God to turbo-charge our praise with everything to hand. It's sacrificial because it's asking the Holy Spirit to direct and empower everything we do. When we are like this, we move from the slavery of sin to the freedom that makes us the holy people God wants us to be.

We are to remember the quarry from which we have been hewn—a rich Jewish background of people in transition from slavery to freedom, who offer their bodies as a spiritual sacrifice in proportion to the freedom they know and live— the kind that God can use. Jesus is able to build his church on souls such as these. Jesus is able to build his church on souls such as ours. In fact, he requires nothing less.
