Second reading

A reading from St Paul's Letter to the Romans

Welcome those who are weak in faith, but not for the purpose of quarreling over opinions. Some believe in eating anything, while the weak eat only vegetables. Those who eat must not despise those who abstain, and those who abstain must not pass judgment on those who eat; for God has welcomed them. Who are you to pass judgment on servants of another? It is before their own lord that they stand or fall. And they will be upheld, for the Lord is able to make them stand. Some judge one day to be better than another, while others judge all days to be alike. Let all be fully convinced in their own minds. Those who observe the day, observe it in honor of the Lord. Also those who eat, eat in honor of the Lord, since they give thanks to God; while those who abstain, abstain in honor of the Lord and give thanks to God. We do not live to ourselves, and we do not die to ourselves. If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord; so then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's. For to this end Christ died and lived again, so that he might be Lord of both the dead and the living. Why do you pass judgment on your brother or sister? Gospel reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew

All Glory to you O Lord.

Peter came and said to Jesus, 'Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?' Jesus said to him, 'Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times.

'For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves. When he began the reckoning, one who owed him ten thousand talents was brought to him; and, as he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, and payment to be made. So the slave fell on his knees before him, saying, "Have

patience with me, and I will pay you everything." And out of pity for him, the lord of that slave released him and forgave him the debt. But that same slave, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow slaves who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat, he said, "Pay what you owe." Then his fellow slave fell down and pleaded with him, "Have patience with me, and I will pay you." But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he would pay the debt. When his fellow slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. Then his lord summoned him and said to him, "You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. Should you not have had mercy on your fellow slave, as I had mercy on you?" And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he would pay his entire debt. So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart.' *Matthew 18:21–35*

Sermon

It's amazing how rarely Jesus seems to have spoken about the Church.

The word 'church' occurs three times in the Gospels. Jesus first mentions the word quite late in Matthew's Gospels, in Matthew 16:13–20, when referring to people who recognised Him as Messiah and Lord, and suggests using St Peter as a kind of template. It means that for Jesus the word 'church' never means a building or an institution but always a group of people and never an individual. That was the reading for last week. We next look toward today's readings.

There are surely many definitions of a church. The verse occurring before today's lectionary reading, Matthew 18:20, is one of the best, when Jesus says, 'Where two or three are gathered in my name, there I am in their midst'. It means the Church that Jesus desires of us is a collection of disciples meeting for him and with him.

Unfortunately, that group can pretend to assemble in Jesus' name, and can fool itself that Jesus is also joining them. They are obvious problems. That's why, in today's passage, Jesus gives us a litmus test of whether such a group is indeed the kind of church that Jesus desires. The clue is their attitude to 'forgiveness'—what is means and how often is occurs so, in effect, whether it's withdrawn or not.

Forgiveness is a slippery word because it can mean different things to different people. It certainly does not mean being treated a 'doormat' or obeying an abuser who says, 'Get over it'. True forgiveness—the kind Jesus wants—can neither be imposed nor demanded. Nor does forgiveness means making light of the harm done.

Forgiveness is never easy. Indeed, as a good generalisation, true forgiveness becomes harder in proportion to the scale of the harm it seeks to address. It's harder still if that harm is repeated. And can feel absolutely impossible if the perpetrator does not acknowledge that harm has been done. Yet Jesus says that forgiveness is the proof positive that we are a genuine church. What is Jesus saying?

Firstly, Jesus is talking about forgiveness within the context of a church, between its members. He is not talking about people outside the church. We're talking about interactions between people who profess the same faith in Jesus, which itself implies that we can appeal to a shared series of beliefs. The penalty for non-compliance is expulsion from the church. The perpetrator will therefore want forgiveness because of the consequences; not fearing the consequences says the perpetrator is not serious about his or her Christian faith. Perhaps it was accidental; maybe it was not intended. It was not deliberate with malice aforethought.

Second, Jesus is talking about a church and, we've seen, a true church comprises people who recognise Jesus as messiah and Son of God. *Forgiveness becomes possible in consequence of our shared spiritual foundations*. We convene as a church in Jesus' name. We worship as a church in the power of his Spirit. Into that context, true forgiveness occurs under the scrutiny of his presence. Forgiveness is therefore a spiritual activity rather than either an intellectual decision ('I have decided to forgive you') or a statement ('forgive you') because it involves the soul. Spiritual relationships always involve God, so a spiritual act of forgiveness occurs with God the Almighty as both its sponsor and as a fellow participant.

Third, we forgive *because we are forgiven*. In his trademark prayer, Jesus tells us to petition God by saying something like 'Forgive us as we forgive those who sin against us.' That 'sin against' does not so much mean a spiritual harm but that God thinks that harming a fellow church member is wrong. It's into that part of the conversation that we ask which of the characters we choose to identify with in today's central parable: are we sinned against or sinning? Jesus is saying that we are the unjust steward because God has forgiven us more than we can conceive or imagine. We have been forgiven by God and pass on the spiritual blessing by forgiving others in the church. That's why Ephesians 4:32 says, 'Forgive each other just as God forgave you in Christ' and Colossians 3:33 is more emphatic still: 'Remember how the Lord forgave you, so you must forgive others'.

Inevitably, we will be hurt by members of the church; and we will cause hurt. Hopefully those hurts will be small, but for many of us they will be big or at least feel big. Jesus tells us to forgive them all. Thankfully God Himself will help us. We must remember that fact we forgive is one of the principal ways in which we demonstrate that we wish to be regarded as true members of the Church Jesus wants.

Prayers of intercession

Through our biases and shortcomings, the life of your Church has been marred by many sinful failures. That in humility we may willingly learn all that you seek to teach us through them. We pray,

All O God of forgiveness, grant mercy.

We cannot keep pace with the risen Christ who goes before us if we are encumbered by guilt. That by regular confession we may shed the burdens of remembered sin and move forward encouraged by the Spirit. We pray,

All O God of forgiveness, grant mercy.

You teach us to confess our sins to one another and call us to further the Church's ministry of reconciliation. That we may reach out to the sick, the alienated and perplexed, those in prison, and the marginalised with your gracious healing and forgiveness. We pray,

All O God of forgiveness, grant mercy.

With hearts humbled by your gracious forgiveness, O God, we now name before you the persons and concerns which you have placed in them ...

Grant, O Lord, that as your Son Jesus Christ prayed for his enemies on the cross, so we may have grace to forgive those who wrongfully or scornfully use us, that we ourselves may be able to receive your forgiveness; through Jesus Christ our Saviour.
