Second reading

A reading from St Paul's Letter to the Philippians

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.

Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on towards the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus. *Philippians 3:4b-14*

Gospel reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew

All Glory to you O Lord.

[Jesus said], 'Listen to another parable. There was a landowner who planted a vineyard, put a fence around it, dug a wine press in it, and built a watch-tower. Then he leased it to tenants and went to another country. When the harvest time had come, he sent his slaves to the tenants to collect his produce. But the tenants seized his slaves and beat one, killed another, and stoned another. Again, he sent other slaves, more than the first; and they treated them in the same way. Finally, he sent his son to them, saying, "They will respect my son." But when the tenants saw the son, they said to themselves, "This is the heir; come, let us kill him and get his inheritance." So they seized him, threw him out of the vineyard, and killed him. Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?' They said to him, 'He will put those wretches to a miserable death, and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will give him the produce at the harvest time.'

Jesus said to them, 'Have you never read in the scriptures:

"The stone that the builders rejected
has become the cornerstone;
this was the Lord's doing,
and it is amazing in our eyes"?

Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that produces the fruits of the kingdom. The one who falls on this stone will be broken to pieces; and it will crush anyone on whom it falls.'

When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard his parables, they realised that he was speaking about them. They wanted to arrest him, but they feared the crowds, because they regarded him as a prophet. *Matthew 21:33–end*

Sermon

Our reading from Philippians today is a wonderfully rich one – Paul continues to be moved and excited by the early hymn from Chapter 2 that extols the wonder of what Christ has done for us.

The language he uses here in his exhortation to press on to the goal is that of the athletics contest. Games were a big thing in Greece and had been for some 500+ years. And it wasn't just the Olympics—there were also the Nemeian, the Pythian, and the Isthmian games. So each year there was at least one Games celebration—and Philippi (being a Greek city) would know all about this so Paul's language echoes with their cultural reflexes.

People, even to this day, give their lives, their energy, and their all to get to the Games. **Counting all loss.** Paul calls us to be those who train to reach the goal, who give their lives to follow the example of Jesus who gave his all for our salvation and for the purposes of God. In practice this has many parts: Learning to be worshippers not just on Sundays, getting to know God better by reading and studying his word, practisers of the presence of God in our lives, knowing him and making him known, and more ...

But suffering Listening to professional athletes it's quite astonishing the level of injury that they are carrying. A recently retired rugby player I heard recently spoke of bulging vertebrae, and of course we now recognise the effect repeated head injuries can have on memory. And in the present World Cup being played, have a look at the number of players taking to the field with major bandaging on thigh muscles. To them the pain is worth it because the goal matters: what they strive for matters so the pain and the struggle is manageable. So for us we know him, and he is precious; and we know his resurrection, so what we're aiming for is worth the struggle.

Completing the journey. Do any of you remember Derek Redmond? Probably not by name but let me describe the incident. He's got to the final of the 400 m at the Olympics, all that effort, all that struggle, all the early mornings and late nights training and the race has started. He's running really well and got about half way round and then suddenly and excruciatingly his hamstring goes and he's flat on his face on the track. The officials rush to help and a stretcher crew approaches but he waves them off and insists on struggling to his feet and hopping and limping his way round the bend. Behind him there is something of a kerfuffle as an older gentleman forces his way from the stands and past security and rushes to Derek's side, it's his father. I'm told that he said to Derek 'you don't have to do this' and Derek said 'I do', then his father said 'we'll do it together'. Derek pressed on and completed the race—no win but it didn't matter, he finished. We are called to finish the race to push on and push through whatever hinders us and make it. We can learn a great deal from Derek's story: Sometimes it seems we're too messed up, carrying too much baggage, failing too often that we can't do it—press on! Sometimes we're faltering and limping and we need help—the father figure could be two things—God himself is accompanying us and strengthening and encouraging us, all very spiritual and airy fairy maybe so how about this—the father figure here is also you and me the church getting alongside one another to cheer on, to support, to hold up and help keep going.

Let's press on to the goal, let's seek to encourage one another and hold one another up as we sometimes limp. To finish here's an interesting thought—I don't remember who won the gold medal that day but I remember Derek Redmond finishing last! It's his passion to reach the goal and that nothing would keep him from it that challenges and inspires me. But I also need you, friends in Christ, to help me in my struggles and limping to press on to the goal.
