Sermon

I wonder why you are a Christian: did you follow a touch of God, or was it a desire to reach Heaven? Did you want to become more like Jesus? Indeed, what do you regard as the goal of your Christian life? And is this goal changing with the years?

That idea of change is wholly biblical. For example, St Paul's glorious 'hymn to love' in 1 Corinthians concludes with the words, 'For now we see only a reflection as in a mirror; then we shall see face to face.' He means that our lives as Christians reflect God and start with a dim view like a reflection in a distant, dirty mirror. The quality of that reflection will improve as we grow in the faith but will only be perfect from the moment of our death when we see God without earthly distractions.

The first half of the last century witnessed vast changes in society, technology, and even ways of thinking and levels of education. Together, they help explain the many changes in the ways we conceive of God, Jesus, Heaven, and faith itself. Look,

for example, at Victorian images of Jesus from the start of the last century then contrast them with more recent images from the time of the millennium. Some are paintings or other visual representations, others appeared in film, others as books or poems. And look at the music his life inspired. All have changed—maybe subtly but probably quite significantly.

This proliferation of images caused a well-known Christian writer to quip, 'By their vision of Jesus you will know them!' Their idea was simple enough: if we think of Jesus as the one, true, perfect man, then our vision of Jesus is likely to be an extension of what *we* hold to be of ultimate value: Jesus represents what we regard as spiritual perfection.

Today in the church calendar, we celebrate All Saint's Day as an opportunity to think about the women and men regarded as holy (though we may prefer words like 'sanctified', 'godly', 'Christlike', and so on). At first sight, the lives of all these saints display a bewildering variety: equal numbers were men and women. Superficially, most were ordinary people and came from all sectors of society, lived in all ages since Jesus, came from all parts of the world, had different coloured skins, and represented every possible background.

But as we look more closely at the saints, we see they demonstrate one theme in common: all of them knew their faith needed to grow. They lived their lives in response to God and His love, but also knew that their knowledge was 'only a reflection as in a mirror'. Each was therefore determined to grow in their faith, which meant a fearless adaptation each time the vision cleared and developed.

It's worth following this line of thought. Some of us aren't really aware of anything that precipitated a Christian commitment: we were born into a Christian home and were swept along into a life of faith. Others became a Christian after an encounter with God when a fleeting 'something' alerted us a to a spiritual reality. Yet others were working toward the Kingdom of God without realising it, and en route encountered people who were Christlike. The nature of that first encounter does not matter. But whatever the door through which we first entered the faith, that initial expression of faith will have been imperfect —'only a reflection as in a mirror'—and therefore in need of frequent updates.

If we are serious about our faith, we will desire for it to grow. At this point many will want to commit to great worker for the church or for Kingdom work such as social action projects. They are all good. But the ways in which we grow in faith will reflect how our internal ideas of God have changed. It is therefore crucial that we ask God to reveal Himself. Only then can we follow.

This All Saints' Day, we may choose to reflect on past saints—men and women of faith who lived in previous centuries. But in scripture, the word 'saint' is always

applied to a person who is fully alive. For example, St Paul addresses his letters to 'The Saints in Ephesus, Corinth, Rome, etc.' These people were saints because their faith is valid, growing, and ever seeking to please God. Each time something external changed, so they adapted their faith to accommodate it, much like moving the steering wheel of a car each time a road changes direction or re-drafting the arguments in an essay each time new facts come to light. In the same way, we can also grow to become saints if we are determined that our faith grows and develops. A static faith is never a growing faith.

Maybe the best response to All Saint's Day is move from studying the saints of the past and start praying that we, ourselves, become saintly, which in practice means a growing sense of who God is. We could start by meditating on the phrase from St John, 'We are the children of God' with its implication of inheriting the traits of our Heavenly Father. In these ways, our ideas of God and of Jesus will change beyond recognition and become wider, deeper, and more loving. To that end, we must then ponder the beatitudes in today's Gospel, comparing ourselves to Jesus: 'Am I peacemaker like Jesus?'; 'Am I poor in Spirit like Jesus?' and so on.

Ultimately, no aspect of our faith remains out of bounds, so our idea of Heaven will change together with our ideas of who can live forever with God. If God is love (1 John 4) then we grow in proportion as we share our love: if Heaven can contain people from every 'tribe and people and language' then we must share our love with everyone regardless of earthly background. Limiting our love to the people we think of as being like us will stunt our growth into saintliness.

In all these ways we are saying to God, 'For now I see only a reflection as in a mirror' and then praying that God will help us perfect that image. As St Paul says in 1 Corinthians 3:18, 'we ... are looking as in a mirror at the glory of the Lord and are being transformed into the same image, changing from glory to glory.'
