Second reading

A reading from St Paul's First Letter to the Thessalonians

Concerning the times and the seasons, brothers and sisters, you do not need to have anything written to you. For you yourselves know very well that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night. When they say, "There is peace and security", then sudden destruction will come upon them, as labour pains come upon a pregnant woman, and there will be no escape! But you, beloved, are not in darkness, for that day to surprise you like a thief; for you are all children of light and children of the day; we are not of the night or of darkness. Gospel reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew All Glory to you O Lord.

[Jesus said], 'For it is as if a man, going on a journey, summoned his slaves and entrusted his property to them; to one he gave five talents, to another two, to another one, to each according to his ability. Then he went away. The one who had received the five talents went off at once and traded with them, and made five more talents. In the same way, the one who had the two talents made two more talents. But the one who had received the one talent went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money. After a long time the master of those slaves came and settled accounts with them.

"Then the one who had received the five talents came forward, bringing five more talents, saying, "Master, you handed over to me five talents; see, I have made five more talents." His master said to him, "Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master."

'And the one with the two talents also came forward, saying, "Master, you handed over to me two talents; see, I have made two more talents." His master said to him, "Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master."

'Then the one who had received the one talent also came forward, saying, "Master, I knew that you were a harsh man, reaping where you did not sow, and gathering where you did not scatter seed; so I was afraid, and I went and hid your talent in the ground. Here you have what is yours." But his master replied, "You wicked and lazy slave! You knew, did you, that I reap where I did not sow, and gather where I did not scatter? Then you ought to have invested my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have received what was my own with interest. So take the talent from him, and give it to the one with the ten talents. For to all those who have, more will be given, and they will have an abundance; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away. As for this worthless slave, throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth".'

Sermon

What would you do if you won the Lottery? If you won a huge sum of money—say, ten million pounds? That much money is hard to even imagine, but really, what would you do with it? Would you pay off all your debts? Buy a new house, with a massive garden? Go on an extravagant, once in a life-time holiday with the family?

Now, another question, slightly different ... what would you do if you were given ten million pounds, not as winnings or a gift, but as a trust? What would you do if you had someone else's money in your care, and you were responsible for handling it on their behalf? How would you treat that money knowing its rightful owner would be coming back for it later?

In the Gospel reading today, Jesus tells a parable—often known as 'the Parable of the Talents'. A talent was a unit of money in the ancient world equivalent to tens of kilogrammes of silver. It was clearly a lot of money, the kind of money no ordinary person could ever earn or would ever hold in their hand. Think of winning the Lottery or holding one of those oversized novelty cheques you see on *Children in Need*, written out for million. But, in today's parable, the slaves are not given this money as a gift, but to hold in trust until their master returns.

In the parable, when the master does return, things take a bit of a dark turn. The first two servants used the money they were given to earn even more—they each return double what they received. The last servant had buried his talent in the ground, where it retained exactly its original value. This last slave is thrown into the outer darkness. The master says, 'To all those who have, more will be given; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away.'

This is another one of those parables, last time it was the parable of the wedding banquet where at the end, it doesn't feel comfortable to just agree because it's unsettling, even upsetting. These parables demand more from us. Especially if we are the servants and the master is God, then what is this parable saying? That God will take away from those who have nothing? That God punishes us if we don't earn a good return on investment?

Really, Jesus? This parable doesn't sound like it came from the same guy who gave us the Beatitudes. It doesn't sound like the Jesus who turned the tables on the money changers in the Temple or who told us not to worry about what we will eat, drink or wear, because God will provide for us. This parable seems to go completely against the idea that we should care for 'the least of these,' when the master takes away what little the third servant had.

If this is a parable about money, then it's a terrible lesson. Take financial risks, don't play it safe, or else God will punish you.

Some of us may have heard a different interpretation of the parable, that it's not about handling money, but about handling our abilities. This is actually how we got the word 'talent' in English. The meaning of the parable then becomes: what are your talents, your skills, your abilities, and how are you using those things?

I don't think it's a bad idea to think about how we're using our God-given abilities, just like I don't think it's a bad idea to think about how we handle our money. I want to offer another way of looking at this parable today. It's not telling us how to handle money. It's not telling us we should use our skills, however humble. Rather, the talents—the treasure entrusted to us—represent the gospel itself. It's the good news of Jesus Christ. The Gospel of Matthew ends with the Great Commission: the risen

Jesus instructs his disciples to go out into the world. 'Go and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you.'

Jesus, their Lord, their master, is going away—ascending into Heaven. He has entrusted them with a great treasure, and they are supposed to go out into the world to proclaim the good news, baptise, and teach. When he was with them, Jesus told his followers, 'You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid. No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven.' Or, as many of us learned it, 'This little light of mine, I'm gonna let it shine. This little light of mine, I'm gonna let it shine, let it shine, let it shine, let it shine.'

If you light a lamp and hide it under a basket, it does no good. Hiding the light defeats its purpose. If you bury your money in the ground, sure, it won't lose its value. But if that talent in the parable is really a message of good news, then hiding it actually does harm. Jesus tells us to let our light shine. Jesus tells us to proclaim the good news. If we go out and share the message we have been given, then it can multiply and spread beyond what we can imagine. There's no point keeping the good news to ourselves. In fact, it would be counter-productive to hide our message from the world.

So, let your light shine. Go out and spread the good news we have received: the good news of God's love in Jesus. Don't hide it under fear of being rejected, don't bury it in cultural baggage or social expectations. Go into the world and boldly tell the story. If you share this good news, it will grow and multiply and affect the lives of others, beyond what you can imagine. Let your light shine for all to see. Amen.
