
Thursday 23 November 2023 St Clement of Rome



Clement was active as an elder in the Church in Rome towards the end of the first century. He was said to have been a disciple of the apostles. He wrote an epistle to the Corinthians which witnessed to ministry in the Church and concerned their authority and duties. That letter clearly showed the authority of one senior presbyter intervening in a conflict in another Church and is full of valuable information about the history of the developing Church and its ministry at this time.

Clement's rather hierarchical view of Church order set a future pattern for episcopal practice and ministry. He seems to have been president of a 'council of presbyters' which governed the Church in Rome, and his letters are clearly written on their behalf.

A fourth-century document suggests he was exiled to the Crimea where he was executed by being thrown into the sea chained to a heavy anchor.

Second reading

A reading from the Revelation of St John the Divine

I saw in the right hand of the one seated on the throne a scroll written on the inside and on the back, sealed with seven seals; and I saw a mighty angel proclaiming with a loud voice, 'Who is worthy to open the scroll and break its seals?' And no one in heaven or on earth or under the earth was able to open the scroll or to look into it. And I began to weep bitterly because no one was found worthy to open the scroll or to look into it. Then one of the elders said to me, 'Do not weep. See, the Lion of the tribe of Judah, the Root of David, has conquered, so that he can open the scroll and its seven seals.'

Then I saw between the throne and the four living creatures and among the elders a Lamb standing as if it had been slaughtered, having seven horns and seven eyes, which are the seven spirits of God sent out into all the earth. He went and took the scroll from the right hand of the one who was seated on the throne. When he had taken the scroll, the four living creatures and the twenty-four elders fell before the Lamb, each holding a harp and golden bowls full of incense, which are the prayers of the saints. They sing a new song:

Gospel reading

Sermon

An unbroken line exists between ourselves back to Jesus and his first disciples. Each disciple represents a single link in that enormously long chain, with Clement being one of the extremely few from near the chain's beginning for whom we have a name.

The image of a chain is a good visual analogy for the transmission of the Gospel because the links in a chain must overlap just as there needs to be a good overlap between the lives of successive generations of disciples for a fruitful transmission of the Gospel. My life overlapped with that of the person who taught me the faith; their life overlapped with the lives of those who inspired them; and so on.

A strong chain requires big links that overlap significantly. There is a myth that says conversion occurs through chance events and that people see Jesus in us straightaway. In fact, we transmit the faith when we truly become part of a person's life and they get to know us ... only then do they see past a façade and discern the inner Christian life we live. The greater the overlap, the stronger the chain. That 'overlap' therefore means time together with fun and food as well as faith and fellowship. In just the same way that our lives were entwined with the lives of those who inspired us, so we need to be part of the lives of those we inspire if we wish to pass on the faith to them.

The purpose of a chain is to bear a weight, hold a load, or transmit a force. To do so, the chain must be taut or stretched for the force at one end to transfer to the other, so a bicycle will not move if its chain is limp and a pulley cannot lift any weight until there is a tension across the chain. Similarly, there is always an effort required in transferring the faith: we must pray, guard ourselves, go out of our way in the 'overlap' of sharing our lives with others. The shorthand word that encompasses all this God-inspired effort is 'love'.

A chain is only as good as its weakest link. Even if some of its links are strong, the defects of others can cause the entire chain to fail. Clement of Rome was clearly a strong 'link' in this particular chain because the faith did transfer through him to the next generation; and there must have been a great many other strong links to have spanned the ages and continents that separate him from us. But as we think of ourselves, are we a strong or a weak link, are we transmitting the Gospel or does it strop with us?

But a chain does not transmit its own power but, rather, helps transmit power from one source or site to another. Similarly, we may be part of the transmission of the Gospel but its power belongs to God. For that reason, we need not fear being weak. True discipleship always acknowledges that the strength and power we display belong to God. It can be spiritually disastrous to mistake the power of the Gospel for our own. We must therefore pray often if the power of Jesus is to pass through us.

As Advent approaches, we recognise how an unbroken line chain of faith links Jesus in his first-century incarnation and his return as Lord and King. The links of that chain include our generation and include us. Are we willing to be that chain, and help pass on the faith?

Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.
