All Praise to you O Christ

Sermon

I wonder if you take notice of urban myths? There seem to be so many of them. An urban myth is something that everyone knows and everyone knows to be true. The only problem is that they're not true. Here's a very simple example: everyone knows that Queen Victoria's catchphrase was, 'We are not amused!' The problem? There is absolutely no evidence she ever used the words, not even once. Indeed, she had an excellent sense of humour and was always playing practical jokes on her friends, family and courtiers —even her Prime Ministers.

Here's another. 'Everyone knows that eight hundred years ago King John signed the Magna Carta.' It's an urban myth because he didn't. Medieval kings never did anything as demeaning as holding a mere pen. In this case, his Chancellor affixed a seal to the document. Indeed, there's not much evidence that King John could even read let along sign something.

Here's one more. If enough people write the word 'Jedi' as their religion on their census forms the Government will be forced to make it an official religion. Certainly at the time of the last census, in 2021, many thousands did just that ... but it made no difference. The urban myth is simply not true.

And here's yet another, which also talks about kings, rulers, and religion. Here goes: 'We cannot know God or experience him.' Once again, it's an urban myth. Why? Because it's not true: *we* can.

I'll start at the beginning which in our case is a Cook's tour explaining the meaning of Christmas. Since the dawn of recorded time and almost certainly long before, people have been yearning to know God. As anyone who only just started on the path of wanting to know God has realised, if ever so slightly, that knowing God requires purity of heart. As God (in the form of Jesus) said in the so-called Sermon on the Mount, 'Blessed are the pure in heart for they will see God,' where the word 'see' here means see through, recognise, appreciate, know. So purity of heart is the highroad that leads to intimacy with God. The real question, though, is 'How?' How is it possible to kick-start the process of being holy enough to know God?

The answer to that question is 'Christmas' (where the '-mass' at the end of the word means 'celebration'). And we celebrate because Christmas remembers God intervening in human history and explains why 'history' ever since has been 'his story'. The whole point of Christmas is to supply the means whereby we can indeed grow into the purity of heart that allows us to know God.

God came into our world at Christmas. Long ago on that first Christmas night in far off Bethlehem, God became a small human-baby sized volume of space that today we worship as Jesus. There was so large an amount of God in the small child that it's simpler to simply say that Jesus *was* God. Such an incarnation had never happened before.

Because God was now living in human form, he was able to understand what it's like to be human. He was able to participate in our affairs and learn first-hand the sheer desperation caused by being human. How prone to wrong-doing we are! So this God-man worked out an answer to the problem of being a human in need of God.

He realised the most obvious problem was our wrong-doing, which prevented us from achieving eternal life. Talking of eternal life, here's another urban myth: 'Walt Disney had his dead body frozen in liquid nitrogen in the hope that future technology could bring him back to life.' Again, it's not true because he was cremated ... in 1966. No—eternal life comes from another route.

Jesus brought about the way to eternal life on the first Easter. He took into his own soul our sins—all of them—as well as their eternal spiritual consequences. That's what he was born for. Being God, he dealt with those sins, destroying them with his own holiness as effectively as a chemist neutralises an acid with an alkali. With the sin gone, with *our* sin gone (if we so wish when we ask him for forgiveness), Jesus enables us to be people with a fresh start. We can be forgiven. We are forgiven. We can be holy. We are holy. We grow into holiness by asking God to live inside of us, in our soul. That is why Christians are people who live with such a radical, inclusive, overwhelming sense of hope.

So the whole point of Christmas is Easter. And the whole point of Easter is holiness. And the whole point of holiness is that we can ask God's mighty Holy Spirit into our lives and he *will* come and live with us, and make us His dwelling place for ever. Having the Spirit in our hearts, we can learn what God is like, to recognise Him, and disprove the silly urban myth that God is unknowable.

Have you heard the urban myth that God is unknowable? Forget it because it's completely untrue.

The Creed

All We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.
On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.
He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit,
the Lord, the giver of life,
who proceeds from the Father and the Son,
who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified,
who has spoken through the prophets.
We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.
We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.
We look for the resurrection of the dead,
and the life of the world to come.

If possible, we confess the *Incarnation*, saying this clause at 12 midnight.

The Liturgy of the Sacrament

Eucharistic Prayer (prayer E)

The Lord be with you

All and also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

All We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

All It is right to give thanks and praise.

All glory and honour be yours always and everywhere, mighty Creator, ever-living God.

We give you thanks and praise for your Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ, who for love of our fallen race humbled himself, was born of the Virgin Mary by the power of your Spirit, and lived as one of us.

In this mystery of the Word made flesh you have caused his light to shine in our hearts, to give knowledge of your glory in the face of Jesus Christ. In him we see our God made visible and so are caught up in the love of the God we cannot see. Therefore with all the angels of heaven we lift our voices to proclaim the glory of your name and sing our joyful hymn of praise:

All Holy, holy, holy Lord,
God of power and might,
