The Baptism of Christ The First Sunday after Epiphany

Covenant Service



The idea of a covenant between a Christian and God appears frequently in the Bible. John Wesley, who started the Methodist movement, wrote a 'Covenant Prayer' to be read aloud once a year at a special service. It was meant to help people to open themselves more fully to God.

He developed a custom of holding Covenant Services near the beginning of a New Year. Typically, as here, the Covenant replaces the Creed

Wesley understood Christian discipleship as a Covenant relationship. It was like a marriage between two human beings on the one side and God in Christ on the other. Ephesians 5:21–33 says it all.

Gospel reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark

All Glory to you O Lord.

John the baptiser appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptised by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, 'The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. I have baptised you with water; but he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit.'

And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. Sermon

Today fact three possible designations. Today is the first Sunday after Epiphany; we also remember the baptism of Christ; and, thirdly, we also affirm our commitment to the Gospel with the annual covenant. At first sight, these three elements look quite different but, as we'll see, they coincide very clearly.

We have entered the first season after Christmas, of **Epiphany**. It formally started yesterday when the Church remembered the three wise men, magi, 'kings', who followed a star and found the baby Jesus. You'll find the story in the first chapter of Matthew's Gospel. They sought Jesus and found him and in token of recognition they offered costly gifts that signified their recognition of who Jesus really was.

The word 'epiphany' itself means a moment of 'revelation' or 'realisation'. In context, therefore, what today we might call 'a lightbulb moment' qualifies as an epiphany. For the church, an epiphany means a realisation of something about God, or that God has chosen to reveal something about Himself, which is essentially the same thing. That's why we make it a habit to look for God during the season of Epiphany and explore the ways in which He reveals Himself and, indeed, the whole concept of revelation.

Our second title for today in the Church calendar is the **Baptism of Christ** during which we remember the formal start of Jesus' ministry. As we read today's Gospel passage, it suggests a hinge, a fulcrum or pivot, about which Jesus' ministry unfolded. Before his baptism involved a period of listening and preparation while afterward was the more active, visible 'doing part' of his life. And, crucially, his baptism was a moment of profound epiphany—it surely doesn't get bigger than this: we've just heard the story of a voice sounding from heaven itself which said, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased'. This epiphany says not only that God exists—if you like, that He's somehow *there*—but also much about His nature: crucially, that He desires a relationship as intimate as that between a parent and their child, with Jesus as Father and Jesus as his dearly loved Son. The rest of the Gospels explore what the Fathership of God meant to Jesus and how he

responded to the knowledge. The Gospels, when read as Jesus' response to epiphany, become longer and richer.

Today's third title or theme is **Covenant Sunday**. A covenant is maybe an old-fashioned word, but it means a promise or legally-binding vow, and in token of which something changes hands. A wedding is a vow with a consequence, so we understand the giving of a ring during the service in that light, for example. In the same way, a legal covenant drawn up by a lawyer has a token amount of money attached, or a seal affixed, or a contract that is formally signed with proof of delivery, and so forth. Our covenant with God today is similarly a promise because we commit to serving God come what may. And in token of the covenant we're making during this service, we give of self and at the same time receive something of God in the form of bread and wine during the Eucharist.

So, to recap, we have three separate themes running through today's service: epiphany, baptism, and covenant. I wonder if you remember Venn diagrams at school? They are diagrams with circles each of which represents something slightly different; we then look at the areas of the areas created when these circles intersect, analysing what they have in common. Well, today's three themes certainly overlap: the section in which all three overlap concerns the theme of epiphany and response. All of us as Christians and followers of the Lord Jesus are committed to looking for God, and we do so in order to know Him better. All of us as Christians have received the gift of the Holy Spirit most notably at our baptism, when we were cleansed in a sacramental way, anointed by the Spirit, and accepted more fully as a dearly-loved child of God. And all of us will shortly say the covenant prayer and enact a sacred yow with God.

The overlap is this: as anointed children of God, we look for God to tell us what He wants for us, looking for an epiphany in which He tells us the next step, the next idea or revelation in our own customised journey of pilgrimage and faith. That step will inevitably mean a new anointing, new cleaning, new equipping for that sew phase of service. *And we commit to respond*. That response will inevitably differ for you and for me, and will differ because the epiphanies themselves will differ, our life circumstances will differ, and so on. But whatever the epiphany and whatever the incidental detail in our lives, we commit to respond to the love of God as it reveals itself. That's it. That is the substance of our covenant today.

Finally, as rings are given during a wedding and a document or contract during a legal ceremony, so we give our lives to God and He gives them back to us but anointed and now sparkling with spiritual eternity.

Today, then, we make our covenant with God.

The Covenant Prayer

Beloved in Christ, let us again claim for ourselves this covenant which God has made with his people, and take upon us the yoke of Christ. This means that we are content that he appoints us our place and work, and that he himself be our reward. I therefore invite you all to renew your Covenant with God the Almighty.

It may be wise to say this pray very slowly, maybe line by line and ponder every word.

All I am no longer my own but yours.

Amen and Amen.

Put me to what you will, rank me with whom you will; put me to doing, put me to suffering; let me be employed for you, or laid aside for you, exalted for you, or brought low for you; let me be full. let me be empty, let me have all things, let me have nothing: I freely and wholeheartedly yield all things to your pleasure and disposal. And now, glorious and blessed God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, you are mine and I am yours. So be it. And the covenant now made on earth. let it be ratified in heaven.
