

Second reading

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Saul was still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, and went to the high priest and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, 'Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?' He asked, 'Who are you, Lord?' The reply came, 'I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do.' The men who were travelling with him stood speechless because they heard the voice but saw no one. Saul got up from the ground, and though his eyes were open, he could see nothing; so they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. For three days he was without sight, and neither ate nor drank.

Now there was a disciple in Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, 'Ananias.' He answered, 'Here I am, Lord.' The Lord said to him, 'Get up and go to the street called Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul. At this moment he is praying, and he has seen in a vision a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him so that he might regain his sight.' But Ananias answered, 'Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem; and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who invoke your name.' But the Lord said to him, 'Go, for he is an instrument whom I have chosen to bring my name before Gentiles and kings and before the people of Israel; I myself will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of my name.'

So Ananias went and entered the house. He laid his hands on Saul and said, 'Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit.' And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptised, and after taking some food, he regained his strength. For several days he was with the disciples in Damascus, and immediately he began to proclaim Jesus in the synagogues, saying, 'He is the Son of God.' All who heard him were amazed and said, 'Is not this the man who made havoc in Jerusalem among those who invoked this name? And has he not come here for the purpose of bringing them bound before the chief priests?' Saul became increasingly more powerful and confounded the Jews who lived in Damascus by proving that Jesus was the Messiah.

Sermon

To begin with, Saul was no ordinary convert. He had a good background as a Jew from the very highest levels of society; he was a Roman citizen; and he had studied under the very best teachers. He therefore knew he was destined for high office.

We do not know the circumstances by which Saul became the oppressor of the early church—was he authorised and sponsored, from above, by the Jewish 'Establishment', or did he choose for himself? If authorised, then it was a clear sign of public trust that he (rather than someone else) had been chosen to deal with so conspicuous a heresy. And if the latter, then he had both substantial private means but also leisure to act as examining prosecutor, travelling widely with a sizeable retinue; he must also have believed in his cause if he was committing so much of his own money.

Saul was a man of impeccable civic credentials but also a man of faith and was schooled in the religious Law. The story in the Acts of the Apostles is not explicit enough, but Saul's investigation acted like a 'court' trying matters of Jewish belief, in much the same way as we commonly think of the Spanish Inquisition. And, like the Inquisition, Saul had the power of life and death, either given officially or he had taken it upon himself. Again, the Acts of the Apostles depicts a man who believed in his own cause.

Paul was a man capable of extremes. Add to this mix that he could be proud: we know he refused to back down after arguing with John Mark (15:30–35). Similarly, he did not do things by halves, so on at least one occasion he preached through the night (Acts 20:7)! Finally, he must also have been hugely strong, especially when a younger man, because he lists in 2 Corinthians 11:25-30 a long list of the woes he'd undergone for the Gospel. All in all, then, Saul must have been a formidable opponent.

Thankfully, there was one redeeming feature in the character of this dynamo: the letters preserved in the New Testament suggest Saul was a man of passion—he was capable of love and loyalty and was willing to respond to those passions in others. And that is why God chose him.

Saul's character may even remind us of King David who loved the Lord, was a lyrical poet, he comes across as impulsive, but God spoke to him. This was the man who was persecuting the early church from a position of moral superiority. Taken together, then, we now have all the jigsaw pieces to explain a crisis of faith—the Conversion of St Paul—that changed history.

Saul came to loath the new religion of Christianity: it was this anger that energised his actions, spurring him and feeding onward. But he saw the converts dying with extreme courage, unlearned men (and women?) speaking eloquently with arguments that he, Saul, struggled to counter—but how could he if these people were prophets, speaking the words from God?!

We this self-righteous man being bested by common people, who could argue against him, who died bravely and with conviction in their new faith. And his pride could not let him acknowledge any of it. Inwardly, he would have seethed and pretended to himself that he was seeing something else, such as stubbornness. He was, as Acts 26:14 puts it, 'kicking against the goads'. It was like an irresistible force acting against an immoveable object, so something had to give. It did.

The occasion occurred while travelling with a retinue toward Damascus. He saw a brilliant light in the sky and heard voices. In context, a strong, deeply-religious, proud man would have assumed God was commissioning him as a prophet—look at the accounts of other prophets being commissioned such as Moses (Exodus 3:1–6), Isaiah (6:1–8), Jeremiah (1:4–9), or Ezekiel (1:1 ff.). Most involved light and all involved voices. *But this celestial voice turned out to be Jesus and accused him of persecution*.

There would have been a sense of shock and shame. The blindness mentioned in Acts is suggestive. But there must have also been an overwhelming sense of

relief as he acknowledged what he's seen previously ('It was of God!') and that he could himself now follow something he had previously desired so strongly. It would have been like the emotional release after capitulating to an intense infatuation. Indeed, he elected for immediate baptism and changed his name: the old man was dead and the new must be seen to have taken his place.

It's now that the story changes gear. It suggests that Saul had a breakdown of sorts. Everything about him changed and—much like a caterpillar turning into a butterfly and involving a painful transition like the stage of a chrysalis: Paul went to Arabia (Galatians 4:24–25) where it's probable that he received what today we would call counselling and tuition from converts living there. All this time, Paul's formidable personality was at work.

Later, as 'Paul' the convert came back, bursting onto the scene with his trademark energy and self-confidence. He was using the same formidable mix of passion and intellect, strength and drive. In consequence, he was creating friends and structures, converts and churches. He also demonstrated the same character flaws, some of which are mentioned above. In short, in some respects he was the same person.

In all these ways, the story of Saul / Paul demonstrates this central truth: the process of 'conversion' starts with repentance which involves the whole of a person's character: we need to repent if we are to end up looking at God in a way we did not before. The word means a complete turning around, a rotation through 180°, but we remain fully human, fully mortal, with the same physical constitution, same history, family, and so on. The principal changes are internal: our soul changes and the drives that define us become God's and are used to build His Kingdom.

To summarise, the story of Saul / Paul, starts with a man working toward a goal using all his mind, soul, heart, and strength, and ends with him directing all those same facets of his personality toward a different end. In a sense, the change is simple enough: he is turning from a false idea of God to serving the real God. In reality, if he genuinely repents, he will also find those facets of personality altered and 'fine-tuned' to God's service, and maybe accentuated.

But the final message is for us. All of us need to work for God with all our mind, soul, heart, and strength. It's wise to be aware of our strength weaknesses, so we do not jeopardise whatever ministries God has given us. But, like Saul / Paul, we will find parts of those ministries are not working for God but for an image of God, or for a caricature, or are working against God. We must therefore live within a continual state of repentance so that our lives are for God and never against Him.
