Edward King



Edward King was born in 1829 and educated at Oriel College, Oxford, the spiritual home of the Oxford Movement which championed Anglo-Catholic styles of worship.

He was not an able student. Nevertheless, he was ordained in 1854 as curate of Wheatley near Oxford. He was soon known as a remarkably effective pastor and counsellor.

In 1862 he was appointed as the Principal of Cuddesdon, a recently founded theological college near Oxford. He led it for ten years during which time the spiritual life of the college flourished.

He was appointed Bishop of Lincoln in 1885. He was the first bishop in the Church of England to wear a mitre since the Reformation and was persecuted mercilessly for it. He died in 1910. There were soon calls for the Church of England to declare him a saint—it's first in nearly 400 years.

Sermon

Edward King was the most unlikely trendsetter. He could be socially awkward and was academically limited. Like Jesus, He taught a spirituality that was both ancient but also was often threatening in its novelty. Like his Lord and Saviour, King was tried before secular courts. Yet, despite this unhelpful pedigree, he became one of the best-loved bishops of his day and was revered as a saint in his own long time. It was prayer that helped him through his excruciations, and that made him Christlike.

King was a man of prayer because he wanted to become like Jesus. His model of prayer is well explained by today's reading from Ezekiel, '[God says], "I will feed them on the mountains ..., by the watercourses, and in all the inhabited parts of the land. I will feed them with good pasture".' King knew God offers good, spiritual nourishment to all regardless of background, wealth, or status.

This talk of 'prayer' does not mean asking for things—prayers that start, 'Dear Lord, please mend / help / support ... 'He was preferred a soaking up of the warm loving presence of God. The fruit of this prayer is not intended as either prosperity or health but simply the comfort of knowing God. Furthermore, by knowing God, we are more likely to trust Him and know where He is calling; if genuine, His holiness will inevitably 'rub off'. Edward King knew all this and so can we.

By contrast, a soul devoted to many things—material things, pleasures, cares, and worries—is like a computer clogged with a virus or warming a house with leaky windows: a significant proportion of the effort is wasted. It perhaps explains

why the author of the Letter to the Hebrews insists, 'Keep your lives free from the love of money, and be content with what you have; for he has said, "I will never leave you or forsake you".' Jesus' trademark prayer in Matthew 6 says much the same thing but in a different way: he says, 'Give us today our *daily* bread' or, again, 'Your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven'. As a paraphrase, Jesus is saying that we should not use prayer to seek *our* will, the results of which are usually disastrous.

There are more ways of praying than people willing to pray. We should therefore explore, finding what works for us: we should search and maybe innovate while ensuring a way of praying that is authentic and spiritual. There are a great many such methods; ask someone who prays often for advice.

It could be argued that today is different: seeking comfort from God was easier for a prophet writing in Bronze Age, centuries before Jesus; perhaps it was easier for Jesus himself and the writer to the Hebrews during the Iron Age, but God (speaking through today's Epistle) reminds us, 'Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and for ever.' He is saying that the spiritual blessings that come from seeking and serving God do not change because the God who bestows them is utterly incapable of change.

Edward King prayed and became the person that God wanted him to be. That he became a College Principal and Bishop is irrelevant: what matters is that he gave comfort and love because, through prayer, he received them from God himself. He surpassed painful obstacles and it was his prayer to become Christlike that overcame them all.
