# The Palm Gospel

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark All Glory to you, O Lord.

When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples and said to them, 'Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, "Why are you doing this?" just say this, "The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately".'

They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, some of the bystanders said to them, 'What are you doing, un-tying the colt?' They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. They brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting, 'Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!' Jesus then entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve. *Mark 11:1–11*

## **Second reading**

A reading from St Paul's Letter to the Philippians

If then there is any encouragement in Christ, any consolation from love, any sharing in the Spirit, any compassion and sympathy, make my joy complete: be of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others. Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross. Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

# **Gospel reading**

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark

All Glory to you O Lord.

As soon as it was morning, the chief priests held a consultation with the elders and scribes and the whole council. They bound Jesus, led him away, and handed him over to Pilate. Pilate asked him, 'Are you the King of the Jews?' He answered him, 'You say so.' Then the chief priests accused him of many things. Pilate asked him again, 'Have you no answer? See how many charges they bring against you.' But Jesus made no further reply, so that Pilate was amazed.

Now at the festival he used to release a prisoner for them, anyone for whom they asked. Now a man called Barabbas was in prison with the rebels who had committed murder during the insurrection. So the crowd came and began to ask Pilate to do for them according to his custom. Then he answered them, 'Do you want me to release for you the King of the Jews?' For he realised that it was out of jealousy that the chief priests had handed him over. But the chief priests stirred up

the crowd to have him release Barabbas for them instead. Pilate spoke to them again, 'Then what do you wish me to do with the man you call the King of the Jews?' They shouted back, 'Crucify him!' Pilate asked them, 'Why, what evil has he done?' But they shouted all the more, 'Crucify him!' So Pilate, wishing to satisfy the crowd, released Barabbas for them; and after flogging Jesus, he handed him over to be crucified.

Then the soldiers led him into the courtyard of the palace (that is, the governor's headquarters); and they called together the whole cohort. And they clothed him in a purple cloak; and after twisting some thorns into a crown, they put it on him. And they began saluting him, 'Hail, King of the Jews!' They struck his head with a reed, spat upon him, and knelt down in homage to him. After mocking him, they stripped him of the purple cloak and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him out to crucify him.

They compelled a passer-by, who was coming in from the country, to carry his cross; it was Simon of Cyrene, the father of Alexander and Rufus. Then they brought Jesus to the place called Golgotha (which means the place of a skull). And they offered him wine mixed with myrrh; but he did not take it. And they crucified him, and divided his clothes among them, casting lots to decide what each should take.

It was nine o'clock in the morning when they crucified him. The inscription of the charge against him read, 'The King of the Jews.' And with him they crucified two bandits, one on his right and one on his left. Those who passed by derided him, shaking their heads and saying, 'Aha! You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself, and come down from the cross!' In the same way the chief priests, along with the scribes, were also mocking him among themselves and saying, 'He saved others; he cannot save himself. Let the Messiah, the King of Israel, come down from the cross now, so that we may see and believe.' Those who were crucified with him also taunted him.

When it was noon, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. At three o'clock Jesus cried out with a loud voice, 'Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?' which means, 'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?' When some of the bystanders heard it, they said, 'Listen, he is calling for Elijah.' And someone ran, filled a sponge with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink, saying, 'Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to take him down.' Then Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last. And the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. Now when the centurion, who stood facing him, saw that in this way he breathed his last, he said, 'Truly this man was God's Son!' *Mark 15:1–39*

#### Sermon

Jesus enters Jerusalem proclaimed as King—but what sort of King were the people expecting and looking for? A King to defeat the Romans, a rebel leader? I believe that's who Judas expected and tried to force Jesus' hand, and note that even Peter tried to defend Jesus by sword at his arrest. A King to reestablish Israel's Kingdom—a King for politics and for temporary and temporal success but hadn't the people failed at this before, have they not learnt their lesson? A King that will let us get on with our lives in safety and not have to change—hmm that's going to disappoint. Who is our King?

#### 1. The King who cries

The entry into Jerusalem—from the east and on a donkey—not via the west gate in pomp (some suggestion that this usual route for the Romans was used the same day—Maybe Pilate, maybe Herod with their usual pomp; note the contrast). Jesus fulfils prophecy of Zechariah.

In the midst of the noise and celebration, palm leaves and hosannas, Jesus weeps over the city. This time not over the distress brokenness causes but more over the stubborn self blindness that refuses to listen.

Jesus enters a city that will turn on him—led by fear of riot, fear of loss of position and influence, fear of Caesar but not fear of God.

What fears are keeping you from following fully?

#### 2. The King who cleanses

Some would have Jesus being threatening and angry here. Jesus is more outraged and acting on it. The moneylenders are prevented from plying their trade in the Temple (the Law declares against usury!) and he drives the animals out.

But why 'outrage'? The animals are there for sacrifice surely—but the Law is about people taking the best of their blessings and bringing them to God—personal—not bringing money and buying a substitute. The sacrifice is diminished, depersonalised. The ritual becomes merely that. And the Temple courts are for people to draw near to God not as a market-place, profit and loss. It's for *prayer*.

But this not only challenges the pockets of the merchants but also the pockets and the authority of the high priestly family and the Sadducees.

'With what shall I come before the Lord?' (Micah 6:6-8).

#### 3. The King who heals

And there in the cleansed Temple courts Jesus acts in healing power. Now openly in front of the rulers and the gathered crowds those broken by illness, indeed those who can come no closer to God than this because of their physical illness (a picture

by God within the Law of our distance from him because of our spiritual brokenness and illness) are freed and can enter fully in. The result is excitement—hosannas and noise and kerfuffle and children underfoot.

Those who tolerated money changers and merchants complain loudly about excited children praising God.

What holds us from truly knowing the living God – what wounds and failures shame us?

Finally, our King is the one who is willing to give himself totally for the sake of his people, to be humbled (the Humble King), to be tortured, to die for the sake of those who will follow and find in Him the King who saves to the uttermost. No-one else can do this. He surrenders power and sacrifices himself for people like you and me, the weak the needy the clever the able all are faced with the challenge—what will you do about this King who calls you to follow him?

#### The Creed

Do you believe and trust in God the Father, the source of all being and life, the one for whom we exist?

All We believe and trust in him.

Do you believe and trust in God the Son, who took our human nature, died for us and rose again?

All We believe and trust in him.

Do you believe and trust in God the Holy Spirit, who gives life to the people of God and makes Christ known in the world?

All We believe and trust in him.

This is the faith of the Church.

All This is our faith.

We believe and trust in one God,
Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

That we, with those who have died in faith, may find mercy in the day of Christ, let us pray to the Lord.

# The Liturgy of the Sacrament

## Eucharistic Prayer (prayer E)

The Lord be with you

All and also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

All We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

All It is right to give thanks and praise.

It is indeed right and just, our duty and our salvation, always and everywhere to give you thanks, holy Father, almighty and eternal God, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

For as the time of his passion and resurrection draws near the whole world is called to acknowledge his hidden majesty. The power of the life-giving cross reveals the judgement that has come upon the world and the triumph of Christ crucified.

He is the victim who dies no more, the Lamb once slain, who lives for ever, our advocate in heaven to plead our cause, exalting us there to join with angels and archangels, for ever praising you and saying:

All Holy, holy, holy Lord,
God of power and might,
heaven and earth are full of your glory.

in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross.

Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.

Great is the mystery of faith:

#### All Christ has died.

Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

Lord of all life,

help us to work together for that day

when your kingdom comes

and justice and mercy will be seen in all the earth.

Look with favour on your people,

gather us in your loving arms

and bring us with all the saints

to feast at your table in heaven.

Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ,

in the unity of the Holy Spirit,

all honour and glory are yours, O loving Father,

for ever and ever.
