First reading

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Peter said: 'I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ—he is Lord of all.

Second reading

A reading from St Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians

Now I should remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you—unless you have come to believe in vain.

For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to someone untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace towards me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them—though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

Gospel reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John

All Glory to you O Lord.

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb.

She ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him.' Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went towards the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead.

The disciples returned to their homes, but Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping?' She said to them, 'They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him.' When she had said this, she turned round and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping? For whom are you looking?' Thinking him to be the gardener, she said to him, 'Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away.' Jesus said to her, 'Mary!' She turned, saying to him in Hebrew, 'Rabbouni!' (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, 'Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God".' Mary Magdalene ran to the disciples and said, 'I have seen the Lord'; and she told them that he had said these things to her. *John 20:1–18*

Sermon

Alleluia! Christ is risen!

At first, the idea of resurrection looks preposterous. The Romans know exactly what they're doing and torture a man. To make sure he's dead, while he is still dying, a Roman soldier sticks a lance into his side: this man is trained, an expert in ways of killing, so he knows. He knows Jesus is dying then makes sure that Jesus really is dead. And he is ... and, just to make sure that no one can even steal what is left of his mangled body, his grisly remains are laid in a nearby tomb, guarded by soldiers, a huge stone is wheeled in front of the tomb, and it's sealed in place. He's dead, dead, dead and obliterated from history.

And yet, within a few short days, his friends are dancing with joy in the streets, preaching that have seen him, and are looking for converts to a new faith based on a once-dead Messiah. Within a generation, it's clear that he's not so much been *obliterated* from history as has *changed* history. History becomes 'his story'. His disciples have written the best-selling book of all time. And, to cap it all, they were saying that this dead man was not just alive but is living in these disciples.

There is only one word to describe what's happened: it's a miracle, pure and simple. And as soon as we invoke the 'M' word, we are saying that it's of God—it's a divine happening. God wants this Jesus alive and to that end is willing to bring him back from the dead—resurrection. Indeed, God is so determined for this Jesus to come back to life that he now lives not just in Heaven but also in common people like Peter and James and John: people like you and like me.

Resurrection looks preposterous from one of the human end of the telescope. But through the other end, the end that sees God, resurrection is the Christian default because Christians are resurrection people.

I said something controversial a moment ago—more odd than resurrection, of Jesus being risen. I said that God wants Jesus to live in people like you and me, and He does so because we are to live the resurrection. God did not merely 'engineer' the resurrection because He wanted Jesus to live again. God did not bring him back from the dead because it was a nice, loving, thing to do; again, while closer to the truth, it's still silly. God performed the mighty resurrection of Jesus to make the world not just a better place but a place that need never be so bad again. Jesus' resurrection was the first instalment, and we are the next.

You're expecting me to say Jesus was resurrected to take away our sins ... and it's entirely true that He did. Jesus took our sins and anyone who says otherwise is placing themselves outside true Christianity. No: Jesus *did* die, he *was* buried, he *did* rise again, and he did so to remove the barrier between earth and Heaven. That resurrection was, and is, God's way of bringing us into a relationship with Himself.

All of us can know God just like an earthly parent knows and loves their child. And He does so out of love.

God is love—the idea permeates all true scripture. At the heart of love is the idea of communion, of sharing, of sharing lives. Jesus was raised to back to life to bring about that sharing so that we can genuinely know God and know Him to the uttermost; we can love God and love Him to the uttermost. That's what Christianity is *for*.

And to make sure all of us are truly excited at this point, God constructs things in a God-shaped way: in God's plan, the best way for us to know God is for Him to live in us, with His Spirit living in our souls—an intimate indwelling, an expression of the profoundest love, ravishing, authentic, and available to all.

The point of love is not love for its own sake. No, it gives value and meaning; it regenerates: it is possible to love a soul out of death into new life. Loving a neighbour can bring about their resurrection because the love of God is always pure miracle.

At this point, someone will say, 'That's OK for you, but *I've* never felt God in that way; I don't know this love.' If anyone is saying that, tell them to look at the scripture written by St John, the apostle who describes God as love. In his Gospel he says these words, 'God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.' It says 'Whoever' with neither embellishment nor qualification, so this gift is for everyone who wants it; all you need to do is ask. That eternal life is from God, and is in God, and is from God, and is about God, and it *is* God.

We love because God first loved us; He loves us so we can love others; those others love yet others. The world changes because each of us has started to live that eternal life. It fulfils Jesus' prayer, 'God's Kingdom come ...' Resurrection again!

So, as I draw to a close, I want to say one thing more: if you have never felt God in your life, your heart, your soul—if you've never *experienced* His resurrection then make a commitment now. Ask Him in: tell Him you want Him; give Him an explicit invitation. You may feel Him straightaway; you may need to wait until God in His loving wisdom knows the time is right. Whatever. But the soul that invites God to live in it will undergo a transformation as profound as turning a grisly butcher's job into the risen Christ—we see the M word again. It's resurrection.

It's 2000 years since Jesus rose from the dead. There has not been one single day since in which God has not miraculously changed a human life and that life has been resurrected. Jesus was the first-instalment of that resurrection, a foretaste; He now offers it to every single follower, to me and to you. Resurrection!

Alleluia! Christ is risen!

Let us pray:

Loving Heavenly Father, Lord of life: we freely give our lives to you and commit to the name of Christ.

Fill us with the same Spirit that raised your Son from death to Easter life, that we may experience true resurrection to spiritual life.
